SPEAKERS, MUSIC ENJOYED AT B-P CLUB GATHERING

Appearing on the Business and Professional Women's lecture program last night with Don Admiral, noted desert lecturer, was G. A. Root of California, who is in the Rogue River valley investigating work being done on the upper Rogue in blaster trust control.

Mr. Root explained the method of infection of this disease, which attacks five-needle pines, which are the eastern and Idaho white pine and the sugar pine. In order to survive and spread, the disease requires host plants, the pine and currant and gooseberry, and back again to the pine. Control of the pest is sought by eliminating as much as possible currant and gooseberry bushes from a radius in which they may infect the timber.

Don Admiral, main speaker for the evening, presented a highly interesting and informative lecture on the "Desert of the Palm," with which he is very familiar, spending six months out of every year living on the desert, studying the plants and animals found there. His talk was accompanied by colored slides, showing the vivid coloring to be found in the arid lands. He also showed pictures representing the winter colony life at Palm Springs, which is popular with movie and society parties.

Raymond Sampson, violinist opened the program with several numbers, and the Madrigal club, under direction of Elsie Carleton Strang, also presented musical selections.

HOOVER MUM ON POLITICAL PLANS

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover walked from train to auto today and was whisked away to a hotel without a single word crossing his lips.

Three times he was asked: "Will you accept the 1936 republican nomination?" The former president walked straight ahead and looked straight ahead, his former secretary, Lawrence Richey, holding his arm.

He ignored all other questions as well. He stopped at the track gates in Grand Central station long enough to take off his hat in acknowledgment of applause from a group of commuters who wanted to see him.

Richey, who met Hoover here, said his former chief would attend a meeting of a life insurance directors today and remain in the city four or five days.

the push although Ethiopian army reinforcements are on their way to bolster the northern defense. (The report of the fall of Aksum had not been confirmed from other sources).

Ras Seyoum, the northern commander of Emperor Haile Selassie's forces, is said to need rifles and ammunition urgently. It was reported here that Americans, whose names were not revealed, have presented the emperor with two airplanes which are soon to be sent from New York. (Under the American neutrality act, such shipments are prohibited).

Ethiopian Losses Small. Contrary to the official announcement in Rome, the Ethiopian losses in the northern zone are believed to be small with the Ethiopian troops maintaining a high morale.

Operations were said to be almost at a stalemate in other sectors. On the Agadon front it was reported that only guerrilla fighting was under way, while Italian airplanes were busy scouting the district surrounding Gashgub.

It was said that tanks had not yet been used in the southern sector and that the Ethiopian commanders there were expecting a push momentarily from Walwal.

BURGLARS ENTER ROSS LANE HOME

Mrs. Robert Skinner reported to city police yesterday that her home on Ross lane, four miles west of Medford, had been broken into, the thief gaining entry through a side window by breaking the glass.

Mr. Skinner told police that a .38 calibre revolver in a shoulder holster, an Elk's tooth in a heavy gold mounting, two Elk's pins, one diamond earring, several Masonic pins, cuff-links and other small articles were taken.

About \$18 in cash was also included in the loot, Mr. Skinner reported, about \$3 of the amount from the Skinner children's bank.

ETHIOPIA PUTS LIMIT ON PRESS DISPATCHES

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The Ethiopian government today ordered foreign correspondents to limit their dispatches to 100 words daily, owing to congested communications. A censorship was put into operation.
