

HEAD OF COLLEGE WILL SPEAK HERE AT CCC MEETING

Professor George W. Peavy, president of Oregon State college and dean of the school of forestry, will be in Medford October 21 and 22 for the welfare and educational conference sponsored by the Medford CCC district. It was announced today. Professor Peavy will be one of the principal speakers on the program.

Alfred Powers, dean and director of general extension for the Oregon state system of higher education, will also take part in the conference, the announcement said. Plans for the affair were being completed at district headquarters today, and about 300 army, forest service and civilian educators are expected for the two-day meeting.

Among those who will take part are Dr. J. B. Griffing, civil educational adviser for the ninth corps area; C. J. Buck, regional forester, Portland; Dr. L. Standley, lecturer on visual education for the University of California extension division; George E. Griffith, public relations officer for forest service region six, Portland; C. B. Show, public relations officer for forest service region five, San Francisco; J. G. McCoubrey, special adviser in vocational education, ninth corps area.

District educational advisers from five other CCC districts will also be here. They include Dr. P. J. Ritter, March Field; E. W. Field, Fort McArthur; H. A. Broadbent, Vancouver barracks; Charles W. Black, Redding; and J. H. Walker, Eureka.

A number of educational advisers from camps in other districts will be here as well as those from the Medford district. Supervisors of the national forests, national park and state forests in this district are expected to be present and take part in the program. All camp project superintendents, camp welfare officers, camp educational advisers and assistants, and editors of camp papers will participate in the conference.

SINGER LIKES AMERICAN TAXES AND COSMETICS NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—(UP)—German Greta Stueckgold, operatic soprano, advanced the world's best reason for becoming an American citizen when she arrived from Europe today waving the Stars and Stripes.

She said: "In America an artist can earn more money and keep more of it than in any other country. Taxation in England and on the continent is terrific... besides, I like American cosmetics."

'COCKTAIL' BILL NOT TO BE ISSUE SPECIAL SESSION

The big concern of those who wish to see Oregon remain wet, however, is the beer parlor situation. They fear that unless a strict control of beer is injected into the liquor statute, the voters of the state, including those who previously voted consistently wet, would place Oregon again in the dry ranks.

The proposed liquor law changes will be classified as emergency legislation and therefore members of the legislature believe that any steering committee that may be appointed would permit introduction of those bills. Under the term emergency, however, will be two other subjects in addition to the new capital proposals and social security legislation.

These subjects will be an attempt to bring down the real property tax within the next three years at least 20 per cent, and the reported anti-gambling measures which were expected to result from the various county campaigns against alleged gambling now in progress.

While State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman will propose a program for financing the state capitol building by direct appropriation of \$500,000 a year for three years and keeping within the six per cent tax limitation, several tax reduction leagues will propose a bill to reduce the tax limit six per cent next year, and additional six per cent cuts each time for the two succeeding years.

The present tax limit law permits an increase of six per cent over the highest figure of any of the three preceding years.

The anti-gambling laws expected to be introduced may go so far as to propose repeal of the pari-mutuel horse and dog races. In addition a state law may be proposed to make all slot machines, marble boards, and

GORE WILL SEEK MORTGAGE RELIEF

A motion seeking relief for W. H. Gore under the terms of the revised Lemke-Prader farm act will be filed in federal court when that body convenes for the annual southern Oregon district term here next Monday by his attorneys George M. Roberts and William McAllister.

The pending judge is expected to set a date for hearing of the motion or order submission of the motion by brief.

Gore, a pioneer farmer of the county, sought relief under the original Lemke-Prader act which was declared unconstitutional by United States supreme court decision.

In a recent ruling in the circuit court by Judge Norton a release of the farm property was ordered and Gore granted possession until then.

The California Joint Stock & Land Bank of San Francisco holds two mortgages on the property for approximately \$80,000 and instituted foreclosure proceedings last July.

Safety Advocate Breaks 3 Rules

SEATTLE, Oct. 10.—(UP)—Chester E. Roberts, wealthy candy manufacturer and member of the Seattle traffic safety council, forfeited \$100 bail by failing to appear tonight and answer reckless driving charges.
