

Oregon Frosh and SONS Tangle Here Tomorrow

DUCKLINGS FACE INITIAL TEST ON VAN SCOYOC GRID

Bob Hinman, Former Medford Star, in Freshman Lineup; Gilinsky, Another Tiger Ace, Is Sons Passer

Coch "Honest John" Warren and a squad of approximately 30 men from the freshman team at the University of Oregon will entrain tonight to meet the Southern Oregon Normal squad on Van Scoyoc field here tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

It will be the first game of the season for the Ducklings, who, regardless of their inexperience, are rated favorites in the contest. The Frosh have abandoned heavy scrimmage work for the last few days to taper off for the game and are said to be in perfect condition, both mentally and physically. In contrast to the green Normal outfit, dogged with injuries.

In the recent game against the Oregon State Rooks at Corvallis, in which the SONS emerged on the short end of a 20-0 count, five of Coach Eberhardt's men received injuries. Although some of these were considered serious at the time, the men are apparently recovering satisfactorily, and will start the game. They include Forest Arlington, center, who went out of the game with a twisted leg; Joe Sandburg was sent in to replace him, and was himself injured a few plays later.

"Red" Strom, big fullback and the line plunger for the Normals, twisted his back. Arpa Ager, first half sustained a sprained ankle, and Captain Fred Carlson, guard, had an already bruised hand further injured in the fray.

Gilinsky Holds Hope Despite their injuries, the SONS will rally their battered forces and play for a win, according to followers of the squad, who were particularly impressed by the showing made against the strong Pacific Badgers in the opening game. Coach Eberhardt has been grooming and polishing the passing attack all week, with Max Gilinsky, former Medford star, doing the toying. The SONS are planning on using the ozone for many of their touchdown attempts.

It seems sure that Bob Hinman, another former Medford star, will start the game for the Frosh at end. Kept on the sidelines with an injured shoulder until this week, dispatches from Eugene indicate that Hinman has been going fast in scrimmage. Another southern Oregonian will

THREE GAMES IN COAST SPOTLIGHT FOR TOMORROW

Bears Meet Webfoots at Portland—Stanford Faces Uclans—Cougars to Take On Montana at Missoula

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Three conference games headline the Pacific coast football program in its third major installment tomorrow, bringing out another army of fans to see a couple of dozen scattered battles on the western slopes.

Fresh from a 10-0 victory over St. Mary's last Saturday, the California Bears meet University of Oregon at Multnomah stadium in Portland, opening the conference campaign for both schools. Five Bear sophomores are slated for starting jobs against "Prink" Callison's squad.

Stanford takes on U.C.L.A. in a conference game at the "farm." Coach "Tiny" Thornhill, worried by reports of the "best Bruin squad in history" by virtue of the 30-7 licking U.C.L.A. handed Oregon State Saturday, will have a full set of players at his command, everyone out of the hospital and supposedly in shape.

At Missoula, Washington State college, with a powerful offensive which whitewashed Willamette 33 to 0 last week, meets Montana in another conference contest.

Armed with an assortment of tricky plays, 72-year-old Amos Alonzo Stagg and his College of the Pacific Tigers play St. Mary's at San Francisco.

At Los Angeles University of Illinois meets Coach Howard Jones' "new" University of Southern California Trojan combination.

Oregon State college meets Gonzaga, victor over Idaho at Corvallis. Santa Clara plays Fresno State on the latter's field, while at Reno, University of Nevada, Whitman college plays Idaho at Moscow.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Oct. 11.—(UP)—Navy defeated University of Virginia, 36-7, Thursday before a homecoming crowd of 16,500 fans in a football game celebrating the 90th anniversary of the founding of the United States naval academy.

The throng, which included several admirals and most of the ranking officers of the navy department, saw Virginia score a brilliant second quarter touchdown on a play begun 10 yards behind its goal line to lead the Middies 7-6 at half time.

FANDOM AT RANDOM

When the University of Oregon Ducklings trot out on the field tomorrow to quack at the SONS of Ashland, big Bob Hinman will be holding down an injury-prone position. On his broad back will be emblazoned the number 66, carried through high school here. "66" Hinman was somewhat surprised when the jersey bearing that number was handed to him at the opening of the season, and considers it a good luck omen. Suffering from an injury to his shoulder it is doubtful if he will play the entire game, but the good luck charm may surprise us all.

Rain plays an important part in the warfare of modern football. The Ducklings and the SONS will feel its effects if they do not actually play in a drizzle, with an advantage going to the much heavier Frosh eleven, said to boast a 200-pound line.

The same advantage will probably go to Medford when they meet the lighter Roseburg team tonight under lights. They outweigh the Indians several pounds to the man, and consequently will find better footing.

If Portland is enjoying the same rain tomorrow that we are having today, the Green and Yellow of Oregon will find the going easier against California's Golden Bears. Used to the slippery mud fields, the Ducks will be at home, and the Californians will slip and slither pathetically.

Probably anticipating a rainy field, Prink Callison has armed himself accordingly, and his new, highly publicized "double cruncher" play will be introduced to a breathless public in Multnomah stadium tomorrow.

The original "cruncher" got its name from the way "Iron Mike" Mikulak used to fold up the opposition with his battering ram drives into the line, and Michek is now carrying on in the old master's shoes. Not so effectively, however, hence the "double" on the cruncher stuff.

Since only one man can carry the ball at a time, it will have to be tomorrow before the appellation has much meaning for us. The play may be designed to cripple two of the opposition, instead of just one. It will be run whether it rains or not.

While rain has forced Callison into using the power bucks as his chief ground gainer, the wily strategist, Slip Madigan of St. Mary's, once used rain to his own purpose. It wasn't actually rain, but it served the purpose. The story goes that Madigan was scheduled to pit his Gaels against San Francisco's Dons at Kezar stadium. With the slippery Tony Donaido scintillating in the Don backfield, the San Francisco attack featured rattle-dazzle offensive tactics, with the spinner, reverse and reverse pass receiving special attention.

Knowing how a wet field would put the kibosh on the attack of the Dons, at the same time favoring his own vastly heavier Moragans, Madigan had the field thoroughly soaked the night before the encounter. With obvious results, the Don speed merchants bogged down from the kickoff and slipped and slid into a rut from which they couldn't break loose. There was no protest against the strategy, either, although the Dons naturally didn't like it.

Which brings to mind the question of playing according to the rules. There is no rule in the book against riding horses, or motorcycles in a game. Unless it would be the one advanced by Branton Finch, Medford line coach, of "flagrant violation of good sportsmanship" horses couldn't be much harder to stop than was Mikulak, at that.
