

FEW STATES READY TO REAP BENEFITS OF SECURITY BILL

Utah Ahead of Northwest Group—Oregon Must Amend Pension and Dependent Child Legislation

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Utah alone of the northwest group of states including in addition Idaho, Oregon and Washington, today has the law machinery necessary to take advantage of all provisions of the Federal Social Security act.

Although Utah has unemployment insurance, old age, aid to dependent children and blind aid laws, Wilbur J. Cohen, an attorney with the social security board, said today that each law must be amended before the state will be able to comply fully with the federal act.

Amendments Needed Idaho, Cohen said, has old age, dependent children and blind aid laws, but must pass legislation for unemployment insurance.

Washington state is in a similar situation, Cohen said, having dependent children, blind aid and old age pension acts, but lacking unemployment insurance.

Needs Not Defined It is impossible to note just what changes will be necessary in the existing legislation in those states, the attorney said, and the security board will not be in a position to give advice toward that end for some time.

"It must also be made clear," he said, "that it is not mandatory for the states to amend their existing social laws to comply with the federal requirements or to pass new legislation so as to take advantage of other federal provisions. It will be necessary for those states, and all others, to have laws complying with the federal statute and to pass laws which they do not have now if they hope to benefit from federal aid in these social problems."

Old age provisions in Idaho, Utah and Washington, already comply with the age limit of 65 set in the federal act. In Oregon, however, the age limit for the state pension is 70 years.

Eventually the Oregon age limit must be lowered to 65 years, Cohen said, although the state will be permitted to pay pensions to only persons who have reached the age of 70 years until 1940.

Game Lands Increased HARRISBURG, Pa. (UP)—In 15 years Pennsylvania has purchased 465,374 acres of game land with \$1,647,708 collected by the game commission for the sale of resident hunting licenses. Before the end of the year, 48,000 acres will be added.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS ARE CELEBRATED BY MATANUSKANS

Alaska Colonists From Midwest Gather in Community Hall for Occasion—Health Conditions Good

PALMER, Alaska, Oct. 11.—(UP)—Electric lights turned on at the Matanuska Colony community center today reminded pilgrims from Midwest states that they were not entirely away from civilization.

An impromptu gathering, attended by most of the 171 remaining families of the experimental agricultural project, celebrated the event at the community hall. Later all colonists will have electricity in their homes.

The community hospital is nearing completion, but prospects are it will lack patients a good share of the time.

Health of the colonists is excellent, despite heavy rains and roaring southwest winds of sub-Arctic autumn. The temporary hospital has been vacant except for occasional patients suffering from minor ills.

All but a few of the families are now in their new houses, and building of the last shelters is progressing rapidly. Not all interior work in the houses is finished, but can be done during the winter months.

Digging of potatoes in the cooperative garden is under way. The spuds were of good quality, and it was hoped there would be enough to supply all families for the winter.

The colonists hope for more harmonious times after departure of the last transient workers to the States, scheduled for this month.

\$1,016,699 CASH BULGES TREASURY

SALEM, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The state treasury was bulging with \$1,016,699.50 in cash on June 30, 1935, plus short term investments of \$952,937.89, it was announced here today following completion of an audit conducted by the state department.

The short term investments included highway bonds, irrigation district interest bonds and certificates of indebtedness against future profits of the state liquor commission.

Collateral of \$11,073,837.22 is on deposit with the state treasurer, mostly furnished by banks in which state funds are deposited, to secure the payment of state funds.

Irrigation district certificates totaling \$1,242,715, seed grain notes of \$3,934.68 and irrigation district warrants of \$71,574.29 were held of no value by the auditors. These were not included in the assets of the treasury department.
