SALEM, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Earl Snell, secretary of state, upon learning of the death of Sam A. Kozer today, issued the following statement: "I was greatly shocked and deeply grieved to learn of the passing of Sam A. Kozer, former secretary of state. His distinguished career in the service of the state and its people made him an outstanding citizen of Oregon. For more than 30 years he was associated with the state department, serving for eight years as secretary of state, and his splendid record in this office won him deserved recognition throughout the state. Probably few other men in the state have had as many friends and he will be greatly missed by them and particularly, too, by his associates in the state department."

110,000 SOLDIERS PARTICIPATING IN ITALIAN ADVANCE

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attempt to entangle Italy in frontier incidents with the adjacent Sudan. Reinforcements of native troops have been sent to the region.

The Italian field headquarters announced today that a slight advance has taken place on the southern, Somaliland front in the last few days "in order to rectify the frontier."

General Rudolfo Graziani sent his troops forward in the Dolo and Walwal regions. It was announced, but they are now halted and are remaining on the defensive. No resistance was encountered.

It was believed that this was the beginning of a movement intended to result in the capture of Harar, strategic capital of the province by the same name and the "Garden of Ethiopia" to unite Italy's colonies of Eritrea and Somaliland and to join the northern and southern armies.

Rush Road Work In the Aduwa region, officers worked alongside men today with pick, shovel and dynamite in an effort to push up roads to the advance troops and to keep them supplied with food and ammunition.

The biggest battle thus far has not been against the Italians, but against the tremendous difficulties offered by the terrain. Narrow roads, hastily thrown together on the base of the old caravan routes, are overcoming the huge differences in altitude.

The enormous difficulties in constructing roads led officers to believe today that their advance into Ethiopia may be halted shortly.

Italy may be contented to occupy the province of Tigre and part of the province of Amhara, the officer said.

The population of Aduwa was returning to normal life in the historic city while Italians were making a heroic effort to run roads into the town in order to supply their troops with victuals and munitions.

The people of Aduwa, who used barter in the first days after the occupation Sunday, exchanging chickens for water and eggs for empty tin cans, now use lire as a medium of exchange. They charge 50 lire (about \$4) for a chicken and 50 centesimi for an egg.

FRATS FINED FOR ILLEGAL RUSHING

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 11.—(AP)—Flagrant violations of rushing rules during freshman week at the University of Oregon brought threat of heavy penalties against the nine Greek letter fraternities on the campus when the inter-fraternity council late yesterday levied fines to back up their regulations.

The council fined offending houses as follows: Alpha Tau Omega, \$30; Gamma Delta, \$5; Phi Sigma Kappa, \$10; Sigma Alpha Epsilon, \$10; Sigma Chi, \$5; Sigma Nu, \$45; and Theta Chi, \$20.

The fraternal groups still have an opportunity to appeal to the inter-fraternity council tribunal to escape the penalties.

Offenses which brought the fines were breaking rushing dates without his permission, refusing information as to the whereabouts of rushers, rushing after the 10:30 deadline and rushing men not properly registered.

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KING ALL PACKED FOR RETURN TO ATHENS

ATHENS, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Special editions of evening newspapers said today former King George II, now in London, has his baggage already packed and is ready to return to Greece to resume his throne the first week in November.

The reports added the Greek minister in London called to congratulate the king. No official communique was issued here, however, but adherents of the monarchy, re-established yesterday by the lightning-like coup d'etat of the "Little Corporal," General George Kondylis, were delirious with happiness after eleven years of republic.

Jelly of the Week - BY ALICE BLAKE - Spiced Grape Jelly (Using fresh grapes) 4 1/2 cups (2 1/2 lbs.) juice 8 cups (3 1/2 lbs.) sugar 1/2 bottle fruit pectin To prepare juice, stem about 3 pounds fully ripe grapes and crush thoroughly. Add 1/2 cup apple vinegar, 1 teaspoon cloves, and 2 teaspoons cinnamon, bring to a boil, cover, and simmer 10 minutes. Place fruit in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure sugar and juice into large saucepan and mix. Bring to a boil over hottest fire and at once add bottled fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/2 minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jelly at once. Makes about 11 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).
