

### BUXOM MILKMAIDS CROON TO COWS IN 'PAILING' CONTEST

Pacific Livestock Exposition  
Has First Milking Mar-  
athon — Hillsboro Girl Is  
Winner of Main Honors

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11.—(UP)—  
Sixty-five buxom farm lassies squat-  
ted on stools under the flanks of  
65 registered cows, proved to the  
world last night that trained fingers  
can still coax milk from the source  
without aid of machinery.

With a squeeze and a squirt and  
a pull, the rosy-cheeked milkmaids  
raised the lines in their galvanized  
pails with foaming, warm fluid. As  
they worked, one sang, off key:  
"Oh, if I had a cow that gave such  
milk,

"I'd dress her in the finest silk  
"And feed her on the best of hay,  
"And milk her forty times a day."  
Some Are Stubborn.

Some of the wistful-eyed cows,  
dragged from their stalls at the Pa-  
cific International Livestock exhibi-  
tion before regular milking time,  
and wary of the appalling throng,  
clung stubbornly to their milk.

To one of these, a milkmaid quoted  
softly an old nursery jingle which  
went like this:  
"Cushy cow bonny, come let down  
thy milk

"And I will give thee a gown of silk,  
"A gown of silk and a silver tea,  
"If thou wilt let down thy milk to  
me."

Heard, the bovine let down  
milk—gallons of it—as the girl's  
strong fingers slipped with reassuring  
pressure from faucet to faucet.

Timekeeper John H. Dodge of De-  
troit, Mich., walked up and down  
behind the long row of Guernseys,  
Holsteins and Herefords, whistling  
happily, although he is president of  
the Dodge Emulsor corporation.

Hillsboro Girl Wins  
At the time limit, the bucket and  
milk of Catherine Boge, Hillsboro,  
Ore., weighed 12 pounds, 12 ounces  
(the bucket weighed about five  
pounds). She won a silver trophy  
and \$15.

Erso Skoko, Clackamas, Ore., maid,  
was second with six ounces less milk  
than Miss Boge, and Vera Hammond,  
Battle Ground, Wash., was third  
with 14 ounces less than the winner.

It was the first milkmaid con-  
test at the exposition since 1922,  
and directors had wondered if there  
were any farm girls these days who  
knew how to milk. The entrants  
ranged in age from 16 to 60.
