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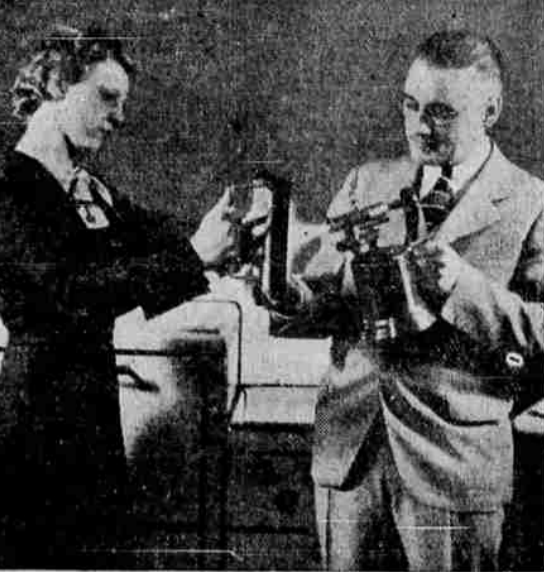
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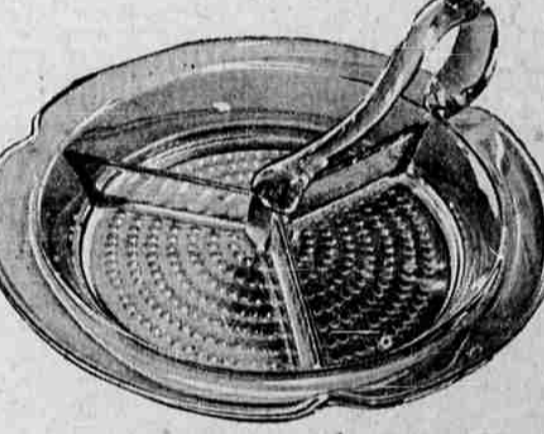
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Unusual Test to Be Held at Wards!

STRANGULATION OF FOREIGN TRADE IS LEAGUE OBJECTIVE

vigorous diplomat at Geneva, Captain Anthony Eden, echoes in the British House of Commons. "What is needed is effective action—now!" Italy spoke bitter resentment yesterday against the league's action of placing an arms embargo against her and lifting the embargo which had operated against Ethiopia. "It means Italy will now have to make greater military effort, and this may weaken her capacity to come to the aid of Europe in the event any attack against Austria's independence should create a war menace," said an Italian spokesman at Geneva. The league's unswerving advance to carry out its punitive measures in the first united effort in world history of nations banded together to "enforce peace," has had no effect upon Il Duce's determination to continue his "civilizing" campaign in Ethiopia.

Charge British Mandate. The Italian press, bitter against Great Britain, is charging the League of Nations is under a British mandate, and that the program of sanctions was "drawn up in London." In the face of the league's action, there were new ship sailings from Naples Saturday with troops and war material. Fourteen ships were hurriedly loading munitions at Naples for imminent departure for East Africa. In London there were more and more indications of an increase of war sentiment. What turn it will take cannot yet be foretold; but England is beginning to think definitely in terms of war possibilities.

As far as actual combat is concerned, all was quiet on the northern front, but it was an ominous quiet. The Italian army and its native African allies were pulling themselves together for the next push, which may come within two weeks. To date the campaign has been the steady occupation of the small northern border of Ethiopia lying below the frontier of Italian Eritrea, along a border perhaps 70 miles wide and at points 40 or more deep.

Thousands of motor trucks and mules are hastily transporting tens of thousands of tons of material needed to maintain armies in a region where nothing except water and isolated patches of green corn is available. The Ethiopians usually grow only enough foodstuffs for their own needs, which are simple, and there is nothing left over. Thus, almost every ounce of material must be transported.

Hundreds of engineers and road laborers are lacking at the rocky, winding trails, literally from dawn to dark. Military engineers in charge of the Addis road work have promised to make the road from Eritrea to Addis, now the advance base, passable in time for General Emilio De Bono, Italian commander in chief, to use it for his formal entry into the mud-butt village where the Italians met disastrous defeat in 1909.

Success a Miracle. If it succeeds, it will be almost a miracle. It requires inconceivable effort in this hostile land, where the forces of nature seem to mock the puny efforts of man. More important, actually, than the military preparations was the defection to the Italian side of Ras Haila Selassie Gugsa, governor of Southern Tigre province, in the northeastern border of Ethiopia. He surrendered with his 12,000 soldiers equipped with rifles and machine guns.

His territory extends for 100 miles southward of Adigrat, on the northern frontier, along the fertile Meccle valley to a point north of Lake Ashangi, which is 130 miles south of Adigrat along the important caravan route through Makale, Desaye and Akpober to Addis Ababa.
