CRATERIAN SHOWS REMARKABLE SHORT SUBJECT ON BILL

One of the most remarkable short subjects being released today is the "March of Time." Starting today, on the same program at the Craterian theater with Katherine Hepburn in Booth Tarkington's "Alice Adams," "The March of Time" has its first local showing.

Starting as a weekly radio act on the CBS chain, "The March of Time" now is one of the air's most popular programs and instead of being but a weekly event is now on the air five evenings each week.

Last year the editors of Time, who produce the act, were prevailed upon to also make it for screen use. Then followed a series of two-reel subjects that were released to theaters throughout the country. However, the subjects were not the finished productions it was hoped they would be and many theaters were reluctant to show them to their patrons.

Now, with almost a year of experience behind them, the editors and the producers of "The March of Time" have a two-reel subject that for sheer timeliness and production values rate with feature pictures. The current subject opening today at the Craterian is the first of these to be shown in Medford.

SOCIAL EDUCATION CLASS IS OFFERED

A course in social education is being offered this year by the general extension division of the Oregon state system of higher education. The class will meet Thursday evenings in Room 2 of the Medford High school building for two hours per night during a period of twelve weeks.

The first meeting of the class will be Thursday, October 17, at 7:30 p.m. Two hours of upper division credit will be allowed for the course. Dr. V. D. Bivin of the Southern Oregon State Normal school will be the instructor.

At a preliminary meeting held last week in Medford, considerable interest was evidenced. However, it will be necessary to obtain an enrollment of at least twenty before the class can be held.

The course is open to anyone whether it is taken for credit or not. An enrollment fee of five dollars is required but no other expense is involved as no text is required. Books for the course will be placed on reserve in the Medford Public Library.

MONTANA SHAKEN BY EARLY QUAKE

HELENA, Mont., Oct. 12.—(AP)—An earthquake that apparently decimated the records in instruments in neighboring states was located without aid of science early today by western Montana residents who stumbled from their beds as walls heaved and chimneys crashed.

St. Louis university's seismograph reported a disturbance at 1:30 a. m., "somewhere in Utah," Regis college, Denver, located the center "probably north of the Canadian border," while University of Washington reported a tremor at 9:15 this morning "5,000 miles west."

All described the shock as "mild," but the residents of a dozen Montana towns, on both sides of the continental divide, awakened from slumber shortly after midnight, were not, for the moment, willing to concede the adjective.

Damage, however, was small. There was no loss of life.

PROSPECTS GOOD FOR NEW RECORD ON FIRE LOSSES

A total of 128 fires in the first nine months of 1935 inflicted damage estimated at \$5,735, according to figures compiled yesterday by Fire Chief Roy Elliott.

The insurance on the properties was \$499,067 and the value of the properties was \$793,400, according to the chief's report.

The fire loss per capita in Medford for the nine months was 47.4-5 cents as against a per capita loss of \$1.98 for the entire United States for the same period, Mr. Elliott stated.

Mr. Elliott said that prospects are good for breaking the mark established in 1934, the best year on record here. For the whole year 1934 the loss from fires was \$11,171, according to the chief's records.
