COUNTY'S BUDGET COMPLETE TODAY IS AIM OF BOARD

The 1935 budget for Jackson county is expected to be completed by the budget committee today, and be ready for first publication within the next couple of days, according to County Judge Earl B. Day. Public hearing on the budget is expected early in November.

The budget committee composed of J. W. McCoy, Ashland, chairman, H. A. Theilroff, Medford, secretary, and M. B. Chase, Table Rock, as the appointive members, and the county court, has been in session since October 2, and completed the budget preparation with less delay than at any budget session of record.

Date for the public hearing is expected to be set within the week, and will be held in the courthouse auditorium.

Funds for repair of bridges and maintenance of roads in the county, not maintained with state aid, and relief appropriations are reported as the main items in the new budget. The county court holds that the bridges and roads, as a matter of repair to retain the original investment. A number of bridges are in need of repair, after several years of depression economy.

Appropriations for county offices and departments are scheduled to be about the same as last year. The relief funds, besides routine cases, will make allowances for the county's share under terms of the Federal Security act, passed by the last session of congress. The special session of the legislature, called for October 21, is scheduled to enact legislation covering the state's part.

ACTIVE GROUPS COMBINE MEETS

The Medford and Ashland Active clubs will hold a joint dinner-meeting at the Ashland hotel in Ashland tomorrow at 7 p. m. for the purpose of discussing plans for the 1936 convention of the international organization in Medford next summer. It was announced today.

The joint meeting is the first of its kind to be held by the two clubs. It is planned to rotate meetings between the two cities about once a month as the Ashland club is co-operating with the local unit in perfecting plans for next year's convention.
