MEDFORD GETS A FINE WRITE UP IN MAGAZINE

Medford and the Rogue River valley get some first page publicity in the November "Country Gentleman" which would pay some real dividends in the months and years to come.
The first farm article in the issue is entitled "A Reverse Grass-Poa Bulbosa" and gives all the high lights about this well-known product originated and produced extensively by C. G. Hoover of this city. The story is illustrated with reproductions of photographs, a close up of the grass and a dairy cow scene in the valley made by Verne Shangle, showing the floor of the valley with Roxy Anne in the background.
The article, exceedingly well written, is by Miss Adeline B. Hinck, associated for many years with Mrs. M. T. Edwards of this city, and entitled "Miss Hinck to take her place among other Medford authors, who have gained national reputations through magazine and literary work.
The Apple Gate Grange comes in for mention for its cooperation in planting over 10,000 pounds of this winter bluegrass to burned-over lands in the foothills of the Siskiyou, and the innumerable advantages of the grass to the country at large are interestingly enumerated.
The article certainly puts Medford and the Rogue River valley on the agricultural map of this country, in a very effective and favorable way, and through a medium which reaches the type of reader this community has always desired to reach.

CITIZENSHIP PAPERS GRANTED 30 ALIENS; BRIEF SERVICE HELD

Thirty aliens were to become naturalized American citizens in federal court this afternoon, with Judge James Alger Fee administering the oath of allegiance.
Eighteen of the applicants for citizenship were from Great Britain, three from Germany, three from Sweden, two from Greece and one each from Rumania, Norway, France and Denmark.
After final citizenship papers had been granted, a brief patriotic service was to be held under the auspices of the American Legion and the D. A. R., with Col. W. H. Paine in charge.

Griffing, acting divisional director of naturalization and immigration. They will be given a hearing at the expiration of at least 90 days.
