**PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 15.**—(AP)—The baseball air was thick today with new talk that Jimmy Foxx may be doing his stunting for another club than the Athletics next year. The rumors—first set in motion since the report started circulating that the burly infielder would go to the Cleveland Indians in a three-cornered deal involving also the Boston Red Sox—started up again with the announcement that Connie Mack has acquired a star first-sacker from the Coast league.

There was no word from Mack—not only because he is out of town, but also for the reason that the A's veteran pilot never talks about those things until he's ready to do it. Foxx, himself, just smiles when you ask him how he'd like wearing different liveries.

But the fact remains that Mack, although he has Jimmy as a capable first-baseman and hitter extraordinary, has obtained another guardian for the initial sack—Jim Oglesby, of Los Angeles, who hit for .365 during the 1935 campaign and averaged better than 300 in his three year coast stay. Formerly with the Western association, Oglesby was picked up by the A's for the usual draft price, \$7500.
