

WHISKY IS GIVEN NEW DEFINITION BY CONTROL UNIT

Federal Board Bows To Science In Stiffening Age Requirements—Clamp On Advertising Is Tightened.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—(AP)—The federal alcohol administration redefined whisky tentatively today to conform with the march of science in distilling.

The new definitions were contained in tentative regulations issued by Franklin C. Hoyt, federal alcohol administrator. Hearings on the proposed new rules will be held October 30 and 31, after which the final draft will have the effect of law.

The definitions include: Straight whisky, a product which has been aged in charred oak barrels for a minimum of one year before bottling. By June 30, 1936, the FAA hopes to extend this aging requirement to two years.

"Blended whisky," a product containing at least 20 per cent of one-year-old straight whisky.

Labels on "whisky" stating the age will be required as in the past. "Gin" means "gin" and there are, in the tentative regulations, no more distinctions between "distilled" and "compound" gin on the grounds that "the product is substantially the same whether distilled or compound."

The standard of identity for Scotch whisky, Irish whisky, brandy, rum, cordials and liquors "have not been substantially altered," the FAA said.

Incident advertising and "statements with reference to the therapeutic or curative effects of the product" which would mislead the customer also are barred in the proposed rules.
