

Staters, After 19 Years of Trying, Conquer U. S. C., 13 to 7

FINAL SPURTS OF TROJANS CHECKED BY EILER'S CATCH

Oregonians Hold Vantage Three Quarters—Hot Sun Saps Corvallis Squad—Gray Is Star.

Zimmerman (Associated Press Sports Writer) MEMORIAL COLLEGE, LOS ANGELES, Oct. 19.—(AP)—After nineteen years of trying, Oregon State defeated the University of Southern California football team here today, 13 to 7, in a thrilling encounter in which the outcome was in doubt almost to the final gun.

A gallant stand in the dying minutes of play after their energy had been sapped by the hard struggle and hot sun, saved the game for Coach Lonnie Stiner's team after it had outplayed the Trojans for three full quarters.

Coach Howard Jones' eleven with Glenn Thompson leading the attack almost pulled the contest out of the fire in those last minutes as it scored once and then swept down to the Beaver 13 yard line only to be held for downs.

Oregon State's two touchdowns came in the second period as the result of a fine mixture of passing and deceptive rushing plays and again in the third the invaders went to the six inch line only to lose possession of the ball there on downs.

Southern California found itself in trouble almost from the outset and never really constituted a threat until late in the third when Thompson was injected into the backfield.

With the game less than three minutes old the team from the north-west had, by virtue of two passes, Joe Gray to John Cassery and Tom Swanson, the latter good for 25 yards, put the ball on the 10 yard line but lacked the scoring punch.

The Beavers bounced right back, however, with a pass Bob Mountain to Swanson, taking the ball to the 12. Wayne Valley and Mountain, aided by an off-side penalty, hammered the line to the 3 and Valley scored but Swanson missed the goal kick.

Troy was in deep water in short order again when Mountain punted out of bounds on the home eleven's one foot line. While Nick Pappas punted out safely, the Beavers broke loose with another of their fine passes, this time Mountain to Cassery and the play was good for 21 yards and a touchdown.

Swanson kicked the extra point. Stiner's team started goalward again almost off the second half kickoff. This time Gray swept through the Trojans for 37 yards to the 4 yard line.

Valley pounded at the line three times going to the one yard mark and then Mountain plowed into center but the ball was inches short of the goal.

The now weary Oregonians stopped one drive on the 25 yard line but with the young 100-pound sophomore quarterback, Thompson, ripping off consistent gains the Trojans came right back with Thompson scoring the touchdown from the 4-yard line.

Sensing the turn of the tide the stands went wild. It appeared in those wild dying minutes that Troy could not be denied for Thompson, this time aided by Cliff Probst, marched right down the field again but the Beavers mustered up enough strength to hold for downs on the 13.

Coach Stiner had sent in as many fresh men as he had left on the bench by this time and Oregon State was forced to punt out almost immediately. However, John Eilers promptly made the cause for Corvallis on the next play when he intercepted Thompson's pass and the game ended seconds later.

The statistics gave Oregon State 11 first downs, to 9 for Southern California and 103 yards by rushing to 83 for the home eleven. The Beavers completed 4 passes for 77 yards against Troy's 6 for 81 but intercepted 4 of the local eleven's throws. O. S. C. also had the punting edge with an average of 36 yards against 33.

FEDERAL'S QUIET MEXICAN REBELS

STINGING DEFEAT HANDED COUGARS BY PHELAN SQUAD

Washington Scores 21 to 0 Victory at Pullman—Cain, Haines and Nowogroski Lead Offense.

ROGERS FIELD, PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 19.—(AP)—The University of Washington Huskies rose to their greatest heights to defeat the powerful Washington State eleven, 21 to 0, here today in their annual "big game"—the football classic of the north-west.

Not only did Coach Jimmy Phelan's Huskies give notice to the Pacific coast conference they are in the championship race in a big way, but they administered Coach Babe Hollingbery his first defeat on Rogers field in the 10 seasons he has been coach of the Cougars.

Although Washington State showed flashes of the power that marked them as championship material early in the season, they were badly outplayed in almost every department of the game, particularly in bucking the line and on defense at critical moments.

The 20,000 customers who packed Rogers stadium had little doubt of the outcome from the first play, on which Byron Haines, Husky half, dashed 70 yards for a touchdown. The Huskies outcharged and outmaneuvered the Cougars, who never once opened with a serious threat.

Washington State's backfield plays refused to click and its line softened early under the terrific pounding of Haines, Cain and Nowogroski. The Huskies scored also in the third and fourth quarters.

The Cougars never were able to advance consistently against the roaring Huskies. Washington advanced for its third period touchdown from its own 45 after an exchange of punts. Flat passes gained 16 and eight yards, to the 15-yard line.

Haines added seven and Nowogroski battered to the one-yard mark on a series of plunges. Cain scored off tackle. Logg again converted. A brilliant 27-yard dash by Cain to the W. S. C. 18-yard line put the Huskies in position for the final touchdown. Austin, substitute for Haines, scored through the line from the one-yard mark.

Washington State scored 11 first downs to Washington's nine, but was outclassed in all other regards. The Cougars completed three out of 18 passes and had four intercepted, while the Huskies clicked on three out of four tries. The Huskies gained 247 yards to 182 for the losers.

Londos at first protested at meeting the marine but, convinced that Kennaston could make it a good match, finally agreed. Londos has only wrestled here once, losing a main event bout to Toke Estes after nearly an hour of muscle grinding. In the other half of the main event Chief Thunderbird of Canada will let out a few lusty war whoops and take after Babe Smolinsky of Poland, another tough heavyweight. Although the chief walloped Toy Aho about very handsly last week, he will have considerable more trouble with the Babe, who belongs to the school that believes in the adage, "He who bites first, second, third and last bites best, always providing he does not bite the dust."

Boland Warren, Copco lineman from Klamath Falls and ever a drawing card here, will see what he can do about the Toy Aho situation. They were both matched in the recent middleweight battle royal, and a nice little feud was started then. It will continue Monday night.

YALE BEATS ARMY, MICHIGAN STATE, RICE, DUKE, LOSE

Place Kick Gives Notre Dame Win From Pitt—Nebraska Tied—Army Downs Harvard.

By HERBERT W. BARKER (Associated Press Sports Writer) The underdog bowled nothing but football "strikes" yesterday and left an already shell-shocked fandom gasping at the defeat of a half dozen prime favorites headed by the Rice Owls, Michigan State Spartans and Duke Blue Devils.

To Boston College and Georgia Tech go the credit for engineering the most startling upsets of the day. Michigan State, with a high-powered array that had steam-rollered all opposition, invaded Boston for what appeared to be a "warm-up" with Boston College but the Eagles turned in an amazing performance to whip the hot favorites, 18-6. Georgia Tech, which ruined Duke's undefeated record two years ago, came through with another hang-up game to win, 6-0, in the most stunning of the south's series of form reversals.

Rice, defending Southwest conference champion, fell before Southern Methodist's fourth-period onslaught, 10-0. Indiana's 7-0 setback at the hands of the University of Cincinnati, and Nebraska's scoreless draw with a Kansas State team which previously had lost to Fort Hays Teachers, likewise came as a shock to form players.

Meanwhile Yale, Ohio State, Minnesota, Purdue, Notre Dame, North Carolina, California, Washington, Army and Dartmouth continued their unbeaten charge through the opposition.

A crowd of 60,000 saw Al Heesberg sprint 20 yards around end for a touchdown and Henry Gardner make the point that gave Yale a 7-6 victory over a battling navy outfit at New Haven. Marty Peters' field goal from the 25-yard line was the margin by which Notre Dame turned back Pitt's Panthers in a spectacular fray that had a crowd of 51,000 wildly excited at South Bend from start to finish.

Ohio State packed entirely too much power for Northwestern, and the Buckeyes rang up their first Big Ten victory, 28-7. Minnesota, meanwhile, swept through Tulane for a 20-0 triumph and Purdue's Boiler-makers trounced Chicago, 19-0.

While virtually all the other southern leaders were getting upset, North Carolina took Davidson into camp, 14-0, to remain unbeaten and so did Georgia, victor over North Carolina State, 13-0. Alabama and Auburn posted spectacular triumphs, both of which would be classed as upsets. Alabama continued its erratic course this time with an awesome 25-0 conquest of Tennessee. Auburn tripped up Kentucky in decisive fashion, 24-0. In the East, Army, led by Charles (Monk) Meyer, subdued Harvard, 13-0, while Dartmouth's backs ran wild against Brown, 41-0. Penn coming back from two defeats, looked like the power it was supposed to be from the start in facing Columbia, 34-0. Fordham, badly beaten by Purdue, likewise showed a reversal in form in taking a 13-7 decision from Vanderbilt's Commodores. Princeton scored 27 points in the final quarter to turn back Rutgers, 29-6. Temple outpointed LaPayette, 32-0. New York University turned in another brilliant display of passing in a 7-7 conquest of Penn Military. Holy Cross suffered a setback in its title hopes, playing a 13-13 draw with Manhattan.

SONS VICTORS AND ALBANY'S RECORD OF LOSSES CLEAN

Upstate School Wins Defeat Honors For Nation—Gilinsky Runs 65 Yards For First Score.

Albany college lost a heart-breaking grid game to Southern Oregon Normal 14 to 0 yesterday and thereby laid claim to the national "defeatist title" with 28 straight losses.

The Albany, Ore., school put up a terrific battle to escape the "honorary" which it had previously shared with Knox and Hobart college, each of whom have been credited with 27 straight defeats. But touchdowns and conversions in the third and fourth periods of Southern Oregon Normal's homecoming game told the tale.

Albany has not won a game since 1931, and in the last 28 contests has totaled 50 points to its opponent's 506. John Nichols, veteran guard who captained the team today, has played in every one of the successive defeats.

In several instances only one touchdown separated the Albany eleven from at least a tie and in the 1932 game with Linfield the latter was only able to eke out a 7 to 2 victory. It has been Albany's misfortune to meet rivals when they were "on" as was Southern Oregon Normal team, and several times it has been conceded that the "champions" have outplayed their opponents. But the record stands.

Max Gilinsky, SONS left half, returned a punt 65 yards in the third period for the first counter and also converted with a placekick. Shumway plunged over from the three-yard line in the final quarter and Gilinsky again booted the ball between the points to end the scoring.

The Normal school's first team was kept on the bench nearly all of the third period while Coach Eberhart waited for an opportunity for a scoring punch to keep intact the Ashland school's record of never having lost a homecoming game.

SLIM CROWD SEES DRIVING OREGON TEAM DOWN IDAHO

HAYWARD FIELD, EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 19.—(AP)—A heavy, driving University of Oregon football team smashed a fast, tricky Idaho eleven 14 to 0 on Hayward field this afternoon. The game sparkled with clicking line plays by the Webfoots, and the spectators thrilled to a dangerous, always-threatening passing attack of the visitors.

Not more than 5,000 persons saw the game. Oregon scored early in the second period after a late first quarter drive had placed the ball in scoring position.

The second goal came in the fourth period after a pass, King to Riordan, had netted ten yards. Two plays later, Braddock carried the ball around left end for a touchdown.

Pepper, sent in to kick, sent the ball between the posts for the extra point. He also had made good after the first touchdown. Today's were the first extra points Oregon had won this season.

With five minutes to go in the final period, Oregon blocked an Idaho kick from back of the goal line, the Webfoots getting the ball on Idaho's 10-yard line. Oregon's scoring threat was stopped when King's pass was intercepted by Devlin back of his own goal.

Idaho kicked out of danger and the game ended with the teams battling in mid-field.

TIGERS' LATERALS AND POWER ROUT MARSHFIELD 33-0

Fred Oeburn, head coach of the Marshfield football team which yesterday went down to defeat before the Medford Tigers, had this to say after the game: "We are lucky we didn't get beat by five more touchdowns. We got all the breaks. I've been playing Medford teams for years, but this outfit is the best of the bunch. They have everything: power, speed, deception and drive."

L. L. Deal, who has been refereeing Medford games since 1930, said this: "That team is 50 per cent stronger than last year's team. How they do it, I don't know, but they've got everything."

A fast breaking Medford high school football team displayed everything except a passing attack, and whirled, spun, lateraled and crashed over five touchdowns to crush the Marshfield Pirates under a 30-0 score with the most diversified attack ever exhibited in a first home game of the season yesterday.

Slowed momentarily at the opening of the game, the Black Tornado soon found its stride and, taking the ball on Marshfield's 40, Smith kicked to the four-yard line. Marshfield kicked to Lewis, who fumbled on the return, but Sakraida recovered. On a sneak play around right end, Estinger went to the eight, they ran the play to the four on a buck, and Smith scored standing up on the next play, a line buck. CALIFORNIA WINS WHEN FREAK KICK PRODUCES 'BREAK'

MEMORIAL STADIUM, BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 19.—(AP)—California's Golden Bears retained an unblemished seasonal record and turned the tables on an old-time rival today with a 8-to-0 win over the University of Santa Clara Broncos.

While 80,000 fans cheered them on, the two elevens matched speed and power in an annual classic that saw California reverse the flow of setbacks started by Santa Clara in 1932.

A touchdown rolled over in the second quarter spelled the margin that decided a great battle. It followed one of the most peculiar "breaks" witnessed here in a long time. Joe Kelley, Santa Clara quarterback, kicked the ball over his own head on a punt and that freak play turned the tide.

From a defending team, in its own territory, California suddenly became the attacking force. The backward punt gave the Bears the oval on their own 37-yard line. Striking swiftly after the sudden turn of events, the boys in blue drove down to Santa Clara's 18-yard stripe.

Here the breaks went against the Bears. Pullback Jack Howard fumbled the ball and Carlson, sub left halfback, recovered for the Broncos.
