CHRISTIAN SCIENCE NO MERE NAME IS LECTURER'S WORD

A lecture on Christian Science, entitled "Christian Science: Not a Mere Name, But Absolute Science," was delivered in the Holy Theatre last evening, under auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, in this city.

The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., was the lecturer. Mr. Young is a member of the Board of Lectureship of The Mother Church.

It is a matter of common information that Christian Science teaches the unreality of evil. In fact, the unreality of evil is one of the propositions of this Science. As a proposition it cannot fail to be found reasonable and demonstrable in the exact proportion that it is understood. It cannot, however, be understood without at first being duly considered. It is admitted to be religiously and scientifically revolutionary. It is not lightly made.

No one was ever more acutely cognizant than was Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, that the trials and sufferings of mankind are so universal, harrowing and destructive that should any system advocate a casual or superficial view or treatment of them it would antagonize intelligent people and be worthy only of rejection. Such, however, is not Christian Science doctrine, for this Science is essentially Christian and humanitarian, and the postulate of the unreality of evil is advanced and advocated for the sole purpose of enabling mankind to overcome evil instead of being overcome by evil.

OLD AGE PENSION CHANGE SOUGHT SALEM, Oct. 21. — (AP) — The first social security bill was thrown into the senate hopper Monday by Senator Alan Bynon, who declared he would follow it with another soon. Bynon stated, however, these were his own bills and were not administration measures.

The first bill, to be known as S22, will reduce the old age pension qualification from 70 years to 65 years. This is to be followed by one which would shift the burden of matching the old age pension fund of the federal government from the counties to the state.

Another proposal would amend the state income tax law to permit corporations contributing to the Portland community chest to make a deduction up to 5 per cent of their income to cover the amount contributed. Bynon explained the federal government permitted that deduction while the state law gave no exemption.

PERSONAL TAXES DUE NOW WARNS SHERIFF'S OFFICE

The 1935 personal taxes are now due and have been turned over to the sheriff's office for collection. Deputy tax collectors will call on all taxpayers soon after November 1.

There are taxes owing as far back as 1930, Sheriff Brown said. "We do not wish to work a hardship upon any one, but are forced to bring the personal tax rolls up to date. The method of payment has been made easy by statute, so there is no excuse for non-payment. The collector will have a statement of all personal taxes owed, and the sheriff's office expects the taxpayer to pay in full or make arrangements for payments on a partial payment plan."

Personal tax notices have been mailed by the assessor. "The law is very plain in the matter," Sheriff Brown further said. "It provides a penalty on the tax collector if he is negligent in collecting personal taxes. People are asked to send in their payments by mail to lessen the expense of collection."

The Oregon law (Chapter 305, Section 60-281) on personal taxes, is cited by the sheriff, as follows: "Immediately after taxes become delinquent each year the tax collector shall proceed to collect all delinquent taxes on personal property. He shall levy upon sufficient goods and chattels belonging to person, firm, corporation or association charged with such taxes, by taking them into his possession, to pay such delinquent taxes, together with interest, penalties and costs. He shall advertise immediately such goods and chattels for sale by posting written or printed notices of the time and place of sale in three public places in the county not less than 10 days prior to such sale and, if payment be not made before the time appointed, the tax collector shall proceed to sell the property at public vendue, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to pay such taxes, interest, penalties and costs, and shall deliver to the purchaser the property so sold, and such sale shall be absolute; provided, if there should be an
