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JURY IN JACKSON CASE HUNG; NEW TRIAL ORDERED

After deliberating all night the jury in the Jackson case failed to agree on a verdict and the case was ordered for re-trial by Judge James Alger Fee in federal court today.

The trial itself consumed only about two hours yesterday afternoon. The case was given to the jury at 4:30. Unable to reach an agreement the jurors deliberated throughout the night and at 9:20 this morning Mayor George W. Porter, jury foreman, reported to Judge Fee that a verdict had not been reached.

The jury was composed of H. C. Galey, Ashland insurance agent, John McArthur, service station operator, Stanley T. Arnold, farmer, and Cecil F. Bacon, carpenter, all of Grants Pass; Henry W. France, dentist, and G. E. Fox, retired, of Medford; R. Gleason, barber, both of Central City; and Mayor Porter, Delroy Getchell, banker, J. W. Antle, merchant, Carl Fichtner, garage man, and John Jensen, contractor, all of Medford.

On motion of U. S. Attorney Carl C. Donough the case of Cecil Dugger, 39, of Coquille, charged with possessing a liquor still, was postponed indefinitely pending permission of the attorney general to dismiss the indictment for lack of evidence.

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COUNCIL MEMBERS FOUND TO FAVOR WATER RESERVOIR

W. P. Stewart, I'm neither for it nor against it. I'm glad it was submitted to the people for them to decide for themselves. I think there are arguments on both sides. At present I don't know how I'll vote myself.

H. S. Deuel: I view the proposal to build a new reservoir with conflicting emotions. If I were to vote today I'd vote against it but by Saturday I might have changed my mind. I do not think it sound economics to spend \$80,000 just to get a federal grant of \$62,350. I am willing to concede that under a theoretical set of circumstances the present storage supply of 4,000,000 gallons might prove inadequate but I am not at all convinced that under the same set of theoretical circumstances a storage supply of 14,000,000 gallons would not also prove inadequate.

W. W. Allen: The city council voted unanimously to submit this proposition to the people so that they might decide for themselves. Anything that I might say for or against the project might be misconstrued one way or another. I do not want anyone to be influenced by what I might say. Therefore I do not care to express my personal attitude.
