Interior of Ethiopia, he found no official response today from the French and British governments to any peace plan he may have offered.

Paris newspapers widely published what they said were the proposals of peace: the disarmament of Haile Selassie's empire; an Italian protectorate over the eastern half of Ethiopia, from north to south; and an international protectorate over the rest.

Paris was filled, too, with reports Premier Pierre Laval has passed these terms on to London.

Official Denials But officially, there were only denials. The French foreign office issued the following communique: "According to news published in different papers, Premier Laval is supposed to have received from Mussolini suggestions for the settlement of the Italo-Ethiopian conflict, among others which were reported to have been communicated this morning by the president of the council to Sir George Russell Clerk, the ambassador of Great Britain.

In the conversations of Laval, there has never yet been a question of suggestions of this nature." The British government had no confirmation of the reports from Paris.

No Peace Suggestions Authoritative official quarters said no peace suggestions of any kind had been received. It was further stated the British foreign office had received no word from Laval since he advised it 10 days ago he was making a new approach to it.

Franklin said today that Nolan had been undercutting the bank for about five or six feet with a cut about four feet high. The rest of the bank from there on up for 12 feet, slipped away in one piece. Those investigating the accident believe that the cave-in occurred between 4:30 and 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The hydraulic ram was buried with Nolan, but the pressure caused by the blocking of the nozzle had become so great that the gasoline motor had been stalled, although the ignition was still on, indicating that the miner was cutting at the time of the cave-in.

Skull Crushed The body was brought to Medford by Deputy Coroner Herb Brown, who was summoned and arrived at the scene a few minutes before the mangled body was found. An examination showed that the man's skull had been crushed, with a long gash along the right side, and both arms and both legs, as well as many other bones, were broken. Nolan is survived by his widow, and four children, Vernon, Jr., 10; Ruth, 12; Betty, 14 and Eleanor, 16, of 17 Newtown street, Medford. Also living is his father and one sister, who live at Empire, Oregon.

Hill, professor of mathematics at the University of Georgia, said last night.

SALEM, Oct. 24.—(AP)—A state planning board report, exclusive of work in connection with the state capitol construction, was filed with Governor Martin here today following conferences of the board at Eugene, Gold Beach, Prineville and other cities. Important among items listed was a program for Willamette valley development through flood control, prevention of erosion, purification of rivers, and irrigation during dry periods. Included among other projects and recommendations listed were: Establishment of tourist promotion division of the state highway commission. Appointment of a public land advisory committee. Consideration of national security legislation, as applicable to the state of Oregon. Filing of five applications for federal public works projects in Oregon. Establishment of a municipal research bureau at the University of Oregon. Promotion of adult education. Consideration of trade possibilities.

G. O. P. CONVENTION GOING TO CHICAGO DECLARES LEADER

(Copyright, 1935, by the Associated Press) CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—(AP)—One of the most influential members of the Republican national committee today said the 1936 convention of the party "unquestionably will be held in Chicago." He said the city will be selected because of its comparatively central location, the availability of hotels and the desirable features of the Chicago stadium where the 1932 GOP presidential nominating convention was held. Democrats also met in Chicago in 1932 at the stadium. The site of the convention will be definitely selected at a meeting next December or January of GOP chieftains who control the party's purse strings. The meeting probably will be held in the east, although there has not been any announcement as to the city. Cleveland, San Francisco, Atlantic City, Minneapolis and Kansas City are in the market for the Republican convention. Usually the city that makes the most attractive offer gets the meeting, and Chicago, under the leadership of George F. Gels, has been quietly attempting to line up financial support for the convention. Gels, who is treasurer of the Republican national committee, has not announced just what progress has been made with the funds campaign.
