Ethiopian War at Glance

ROME—Italy will fight "desperately" against league sanctions, Mussolini tells fascists in beligerent message. Big naval building program announced.

HARAR—Italian bombers menace Ethiopian outposts on southern front, threatening main Ethiopian concentrations.

LONDON—Britain receives Mussolini's peace proposals but is expected to reject them and proceed with sanctions. Government in election manifesto says it will stand solidly with league and proceed with national rearmament for defense.

ADDIS ABABA—Italian minister sent towards border under heavy guard.

PARIS—Britain's refusal to postpone applications of sanctions understood to have been communicated to France.

WASHINGTON—United States expresses sympathy with league's efforts but declines to join in them.

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TURKEY DRESSING LESSONS LISTED

Turkey killing and dressing demonstrations will be held Tuesday, October 29, at the following two places in Jackson county, according to an announcement by R. G. Fowler, county agent.

10 a. m.—Ed Dimmick's farm in Evans valley, one mile north of Wimer store.
2:00 p. m.—Thos. Hatfield's farm, two miles from Crater Lake highway on Alta Vista road. Going north on the Crater Lake highway, turn right one mile south of Eagle Point and go east two miles.

McKinley Huntington, of Yoncalla has been secured by the O. S. C. extension service to conduct the demonstrations. All growers are asked to attend one of these meetings, if possible.

EARLY HOG-CORN VOTE FAVORABLE FOR CONTINUANCE

With heavy voting reported in the heart of the corn belt, an early check about 29 contract signers in Chicago saw county, Iowa, cast affirmative ballots with four opposed. One non-signer also favored continuance.

In the first five Tennessee counties to report, contract signers voted 674 to 43, and non-signers 67 to 12 for a 1936 program. In Colquitt county, Georgia, the favorable vote was 27 to 9 among non-signers.

From 8 a. m. to 10 p. m. corn and hog producers in 46 states marched into county centers to vote a simple "yes" or "no" to the question, "do you favor a corn-hog adjustment program to follow the 1935 program which expires November 10, 1937?"

At Washington, reports of heavy balloting were interpreted by AAA officials as an indication that the farm administration would be given orders to continue its program. A light vote, they said, would have been an unfavorable sign.
