Claudette Colbert In Craterian Show; War Films On Bill

A program that may easily be classed as one of the finest to be shown at a local theatre for a long time is the current Craterian show consisting of Claudette Colbert's delightful comedy-romance, "She Married Her Boss," and the extremely interesting "Wings Over Ethiopia."

"She Married Her Boss" has the same carefree abandon that made "It Happened One Night" such a hit, and with Miss Colbert, who won an Academy award for her work in the first picture, again in a starring role, the film is the type of entertainment that should appeal to everybody, regardless of his or her usual cinema likes.

At Julia Scott, Miss Colbert is the very efficient secretary who carefully falls in love with and marries her boss (Melvyn Douglas). The boss is a dyspeptic young man who has already had one unsuccessful marriage; his life made further unhappy by an unmanageable, spoiled nine year old daughter and an old-maidish, bitter sister who runs—and ruins—the household. All this, Julia Scott inherits when she unsuspectingly says "I do."

But what the young wife does not know is that the boss had married her for her efficiency, not evident in the office, expecting it to prove a blessing in getting his mixed-up home life straightened out. But when Julia forgets about office routine and be-

comes just a loving wife, the marriage turns out to be the maddest thing ever, further complicated by playboy Michael Bartlett falling head over heels in love with the charming Julia.

The fun continues fast and furious, with Miss Colbert the storm center. Melvyn Douglas does a fine piece of work—in fact, the best he's done for a long time, and Michael Bartlett proves himself thoroughly engaging as the devil-may-care chap who tries to run the secretary's affairs for her.

"Wings Over Ethiopia," on the other hand, although possessing serious merit, is a picture that is a keen insight into the country that has not rates headline news. There are sufficient thrills and gasps to satisfy any audience, particularly those addicted to spine-tingling entertainment.

The picture is a faithful celluloid record of that strange country over which there has already been so much bloodshed, the customs and habits of the tribes that inhabit it, with scenes from both land and air. Giving a brief resume of the state that England and France have in Ethiopia, and the very lively interest of Japan in the country, "Wings Over Ethiopia," has some remarkable photography, particularly the effect gotten by shooting a native dance by women against the light so as to actually get a silhouette effect, punctuated by flashing white teeth. And, for sheer timeliness of interest, where could one find better?
