

BALDWIN IN HOPE U. S. WILL ENTER LEAGUE SPEEDILY

New Pleas for Italian Friendship and Aid in Peace Efforts Made—Britain Must Keep Pledge to League

LONDON, Nov. 1. —(AP)—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin said today he hoped the United States would join the League of Nations in the near future.

He told the International Peace society: "I wish they were in it—I hope that before long they will be in it."

"The United States has never been a member, although their president (Wilson) moulded the league and, despite all checks and disappointments, was able to see his vision take place."

"I am certain there are millions of American citizens who are watching with lively sympathy our efforts to make the league an instrument of world peace."

Sees Italian Mistake
Previously, the prime minister told the society that "we believe Italy is really departing from her great traditions, by the war against Ethiopia."

At the same time he made a new plea for Italian friendship and for Italian co-operations with the League of Nations efforts to re-establish peace.

"The dispute between the league and Italy is real," he declared, "but it is no more real than the friendship between Great Britain and Italy."

"We have tried to make it clear that we are moving in no spirit of national antagonism against Italy."

"If we have failed to make it clear, we must try again, for behind all our present policy is that underlying truth."

Must Keep Pledge
"In being true to our pledged word to the league, we wish also to preserve an old friendship. But loyalty to our pledge is inescapable."

The prime minister asserted: "All talk of trouble is evil. It is a condition which has been developed in some quarters overseas and I do not like it."

"We do not dedicate ourselves to such evil and there is no spirit of aggression. But weakness and wavering do not give an assurance of peace. I give you my word there will be no great armaments here."

DUKES TO FIGHT ARKANSAS RETURN

Curtis Dukes, arrested near Kerby, Josephine county by state police the first of the week on a charge of violating his parole from the Arkansas state prison, will fight extradition, Josephine county friends, county authorities state, have provided legal aid.

No word has been received from Arkansas authorities relative to the return of Dukes.

District Attorney Codding said today that Dukes was also wanted by the postal authorities, but no information was forthcoming on the nature of the charge.

Dukes has been living with his wife and two children in Josephine county, and engaged in working for a miner. He claims he has been a law-abiding citizen since his parole.

Dukes was originally sentenced to the Arkansas prison for assault by kidnapping.

FIR ORDERS DECREASE, SHIPMENTS INCREASE IN NORTHWEST REGION

SEATTLE, Nov. 1. —(AP)—Production and orders of Douglas fir region mills in Oregon and Washington showed a decrease for the week ending October 26, but shipments increased, the West Coast Lumbermen's association said today.

The association added that the industry is in a seasonal period of full normal in the late fall and early winter.

Production of 97,402,142 feet of lumber was reported by 201 mills, about 2,730,000 feet under the preceding week.

New business was 83,143,965 feet against a production of 97,402,142 feet and shipments of 96,843,107 feet. Shipments were 6.7 per cent under production, sales 12.6 per cent under production and orders 8.3 per cent less than the previous week.

The 201 mills show an increase of 23.8 per cent in orders so far this year over the same period last year. Orders this year are 3,382,325,000 feet compared with 2,716,551,000 feet last year.

Unfilled orders are \$18,219,816 feet, about 7,000,000 feet under last week. Inventories are 24.5 per cent less than at this time last year.

PINE MILLS SHOW GAIN IN BUSINESS

PORTLAND, Nov. 1. —(AP)—New business totaling 47,086,000 feet, about 30 per cent above the three-year weekly average for October, was reported today by the Western Pine association for the week ending October 26.

Shipments were 54,770,000 feet, and production 6,280,000 feet.

For the corresponding week last year the same 107 mills reported orders of 33,711,000 feet, and production of 33,088,000 feet.

For the year to date, orders have been 43 per cent greater than for the corresponding period last year.

VOLUNTEER TAX PAYMENTS GOOD

Volunteer payment of personal taxes has shown a steady increase the past week, according to the tax collection department of the sheriff's office, following the notice of Sheriff Fred I. Brown that collections would be made.

Starting next week, Sheriff Brown plans to place deputies in the field to make personal contacts for collections. The county will be divided into sections and calls made. Unless full or partial payments are made, levies will be filed against the personal property taxed. The deputies will be the regular staff.

Under Oregon law the sheriff is held responsible for collection of personal property taxes. This year is the first time in several years a sheriff has made a systematic effort to collect them, it is declared.
