

### PRISON MEN GIVE SURGEONS CHANCE FOR TOOTH STUDY

Good Results Reported in Treating Gum Disease Before Headway Is Made—San Quentin Lends Aid

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 1.—(AP)—San Quentin penitentiary prisoners furnished the American College of Surgeons today with the first extensive object lesson of the sufferings that may be relieved by early treatment of pyorrhea, one of the most widespread human ills.

Four hundred prisoners volunteered a year ago to be treated in a stage of this tooth trouble when ordinarily little attention is paid to it.

Today's report presented the first results. It was made by Drs. Paul J. Boyens, Alexander G. Bartlett, Hilarie G. Marquez, George F. Ovideo, I. C. Gobar of San Francisco, and Leo Stanley, prison physician. The study was made for the California Academy of Periodontology.

Of the 400 volunteers, 39 have been selected for treatment, and the results for 70 of them were given today. These men had the "early stage" before the teeth became loose, and had no systemic diseases which might complicate the experiments.

They were given a recently developed treatment by which diseased parts of the gums are removed surgically, after which the standard pyorrhea prophylaxis is employed.

Before treatment, these men had complained of physical fatigue, stomach disorders and nervousness. Their improvement, the examiners reported, began anywhere from the second day of the treatment to six months afterward.

In all cases the improvement has lasted unimpaird up to date, which in the longest instances is about a year.

Two of the men who had heart trouble not attributed to pyorrhea showed improvement. Digestive disorders improved in three out of four treated. Headaches were less, but backaches remained unaffected.

The object of the San Quentin study was described as finding out whether pyorrhea undermines health before the victim is conscious of local pain and before any of his teeth are jeopardized.

Seek Store Tax.

The house today saw introduction of a chainstore tax bill, ranging from \$2 to \$750 for one to more than 50 stores. In its short session it passed two minor bills, after which members listened to the senate debate on the capitol bill.

The senate overrode Governor Martin's veto of house bill 436, passed at the regular 1935 session, crediting Tillamook county with \$24,700 of uncollected state taxes resulting from the disastrous timber fire there in 1933.

The house passed the bill over the governor's veto earlier in the week. The measure later was reported out unfavorably by a majority of the senate ways and means committee, but was passed over the adverse report by a vote of 21 to 9.

Unconstitutionality Seen. Senator Staples declared that a large percentage of the taxes of Tillamook county were delinquent at the present time and many farmers had been unable to meet their obligations.

"I can see no difference between this bill and the one remitting state

taxes to the city of Astoria following the fire there," Staples continued. Senators arguing to uphold the governor's veto alleged that the bill was unconstitutional and would be so declared by the courts.

"What is the use of passing an unconstitutional bill?" Senator Wallace queried. He also referred to an opinion of Attorney-General VanWinkle, which held the bill would not stand a court test.
