

BEAVER COLONIES WILL BE SHIFTED FROM THIS AREA

Furry Animals Viewed As Economic Asset in Preventing Soil Erosion—Farmers, However, Kick

To a trapper the beaver is only an animal with an income-producing pelt, and to milady the furry creature is only the source of fashionable coats and wraps, but to J. F. Branson the beaver is an animal of such economic importance that it needs protection.

In fact, Mr. Branson pointed out to the Mail Tribune today, where there are beaver colonies the soil is 20 times as productive of forage as where there are none. Beavers, he also said, prevent soil erosion by damming up streams and keeping the earth watered over a large area. They do a lot of other good that no one thinks about, Mr. Branson related in scientific terms slightly over the head of your correspondent, and Mr. Branson ought to know, for he is the junior district agent of the United States biological survey, stationed at Roseburg.

Causes Damage
Unfortunately, the beaver does a considerable damage to crops, trees and river banks, and for that reason the farmers do not like the little animals, Mr. Branson related. The farmer, in fact, would like to see the creatures removed to sections where they cannot chop down fruit trees by eating away the trunk to get a food supply of bark.

That's why Mr. Branson is here. He is working with Ralph H. Olson, an assistant biologist of the U. S. forest service, in transferring beavers from areas where they are inflicting crop damage to sections at headwaters where they may eat and play and build without annoying anyone.

The nearest beaver colony to Medford, Mr. Branson said, is on Bear creek near Jackson Hot Springs. This colony and others in this general locality are to be moved to quarters that are more desirable from the beavers' and farmers' point of view.

Make Smart Pets
Beavers are smart little animals that are kind and considerate, Mr. Branson said, adding that they quickly become pets. They never should be considered merely as pests for fur coats, he stated, as their economic value when alive is transcendent.

Mr. Branson and Mr. Olson had a beaver with them today. It will be placed on exhibition in a Medford store window so that it may be viewed by all who are interested in seeing a beaver at close range.
