INDIANA BATTLES IOWA TO 6-6 TIE

IOWA CITY, Ia., Nov. 2.—(AP)—Down-trodden Indiana, thrice beaten, rose up from the Big Ten football cellar like a post-Halloween ghost here today to haunt Iowa's hopes for a conference title by holding the favored Hawkeyes to a six to six tie before 20,000 rain-soaked spectators.

Only one Simmons, the willow-hipped negro fullback, saved the Hawkeyes from defeat. The alppery Texas athlete whirled around his left end, behind perfect interference in the third quarter, dashed madly along the east sidelines and whirled his way for a 59-yard touchdown run.

ASTORIA THUMPS SALEM WITH EASE

ASTORIA, Ore., Nov. 2.—(AP)—Two sudden thrusts brought Astoria high a 12 to 6 victory over the speedy Salem high football team here last night.

Astoria took the first kickoff and rumbled the ball to the Salem 30-yard line. A long pass over the goal line gave Astoria a 6 to 0 lead in the first minute of play.

Just before halftime Ken Olsen, Astoria halfback, dashed 30 yards on a fake reverse to score another touchdown.
