business and industrial leaders in New York and Chicago, in Texas and Louisiana, and elsewhere. Industrial and trade conditions are greatly improved. All with whom I came in contact seemed convinced that business is definitely on the up-grade. I found this true everywhere without a single important dissenting voice.

"As no time since the depression started has there been such unanimity of better feeling. That the turn in sentiment is particularly noticeable in New York City seems significant in view of the gloomy outlook that has prevailed in the financial community there until very recently.

"All this goes deeper than mere surface sentiment. There is evidence of a basic policy of business and industrial leaders during the last few months.

"Since the beginning of the depression and until recently the policy of business generally has been to safeguard stability and to conserve cash in each individual case, involving general abandonment of new projects and postponement of much current maintenance work, with a consequent cutting down of payrolls.

"Now, however, business seems to have taken the initiative again, with a go-ahead spirit not manifest before the depression period.

"The decision of the United States Supreme Court with respect to the National Recovery Act may be mentioned among the incidents and influences that have helped remove the feeling of uncertainty general in business, big and little.

"More recently the President's assurance that business is to be given a 'breathing spell' has further helped. And expenditure of government money has contributed to current business activity.

"The growing volume of traffic on Southern Pacific Lines reflects the general increase in business."

RUSSIAN SINGER TO APPEAR HERE NOV. 14 SPONSORED BY BPW

He was invited to appear before the Anglo-American Music Education conference in Switzerland, to demonstrate to the conference what is being presented in the United States in our colleges and universities by way of authentic folk music. The English section invited Walevitch to return to them for the next conference.

DEATH OF SEN. GOSS UNAVOIDABLE IS VIEW OF CORONER IN SALEM

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Salem today mourned the loss of State Senator John Goss, 66, of Marshfield who was struck and killed by a Greyhound bus here Saturday night at 10:18 o'clock.

After conferring with the district attorney and police officers, Coroner L. E. Barwick said no inquest would be held.

Meantime the county courts of Goss and Curry counties, from which Senator Goss was elected, were expected to meet today to name a successor.

Judge Hugh McLain of Goss and Judge C. H. Bailey of Curry county said they would call their courts together today.

The body of Goss was sent to Marshfield last night and his funeral services will be held there Tuesday.

Senator Goss had emerged from the home of John Carson, Salem attorney, and was crossing south Commercial street—the Pacific Highway—when the bus struck him.

"I didn't see him until he was hit," said W. L. Boes of Salem who was deadheading the big 21-passenger bus between Salem and Corvallis.

Goss' body was carried 38 feet, police said, but the only mark was a bruise on the back of his left hand. Death was instantaneous.
