CAPITOL BILL HITS SENATE SNAG



News Behind The News

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—See Farley is supposed to have made a novel personal diagnosis of the political situation for President Roosevelt prior to the elections. His accounts are supposed to have reported that the country is against a considerable portion of the New Deal, but not equally against Mr. Roosevelt.

That is, the Paul Mallon Literary Digest preliminary trend poll may have been nearly accurate in sensing that the country is 3 to 2 against some parts of the New Deal program. But the Farley contention is that Mr. Roosevelt's personal following is such that, if he had been running Tuesday against no one in particular, the national result would have been 3 to 2 in his favor.

Specifically, the Farley boys expected to suffer losses in New York and Pennsylvania Tuesday but believed they could have carried the states if Mr. Roosevelt had been running.

In other words, the consulting office New Deal inner viewpoint is that the New Deal is now emphatically in a duplex voting humor.

This is a ponderous thought, if nothing else. It may sound off-hand, like an epigrammatic advance excuse for some bad news which Mr. Farley was expecting. At the same time, there can be no doubt that the foremost New Deal politicians really believe it.

Likewise it explains why there has been a lack of political perturbation on the part of the New Deal.

Mr. Hoover has not yet weakened to the demand (largely from his admirers) to resign.

It is a long time since the nation has seen a political scandal of this magnitude. The Senate is expected to pass the bill in the next 24 hours.

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REFUSE SANCTION FOR AMENDMENTS SOUGHT BY HOUSE

Measure Is Referred to Conference Committee—Power to Select Site Left to Commission of Nine

SALEM, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The senate, during the noon hour today, unanimously voted not to concur in the house amendments to the capitol bill and the matter was referred to a conference committee. Senator Zimmerman's motion to refer the bill again to the joint reconstruction committee was lost.

The senate conference committee will comprise Senators Frank Francovich, Robert Egan and Walter E. Pearson. Representatives Hyde Barnes, Homer Angell and C. F. Hyde were named to the conference committee. A report from the conference committee, Francovich stated, would be in within the next 24 hours.

SALEM, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Rushing through with rapidly bordering upon "railroading" the house of the Oregon legislature today passed the revised capitol bill and sent it back to the senate for concurrence in amendments, which it was understood would not be possible without "trades" in a subsequent conference committee.

Three Main Changes Seen.
The bill as passed would amend the senate bill in three chief particulars, change the capitol commission from seven to nine members with the latter given power to select the site, add Calaveras Heights to the consideration, and reduce the cost from \$3,500,000 to \$2,500,000.

Other changes of minor nature were also made.
The new capitol proposal was passed as reported out by the majority of the house committee on public institutions.

The exact nature of the expected trades could not be definitely stated, but it was reported the conference committee may report the bill out in a form similar to this:

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Still intermittently jostled by convulsive earth movements, Helena was given a sound jolting at 8:25 a. m. today by one of the stiffest after-shocks since October 31 when two persons were killed, many injured and much additional damage inflicted.

Through no new damage was reported, the severe jarring served to open wider cracks in buildings still standing; to rattle and knock down loosened objects and to momentarily frighten a city grown somewhat used to less severe jolting.

Profiteering Ban Holds Ethical Prices In Check

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Americans who complain of the high costs of living at home would find Ethiopia a paradise of economical purchases.

Despite the great cost of the current war with Italy, Ethiopia has remained one of the world's cheapest countries for living.

As a consequence of price control measures taken by Emperor Haile Selassie, on behalf of the government the price of eggs fell today to 2 cents a dozen, beef to 3 cents a pound, lamb to 2 cents a pound and a whole cow to \$6.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Lt. Gov. A. B. (Happy) Chandler, bitterly opposed by certain leaders of his own Democratic party, had a 6,000 majority over Circuit Judge King Swepe, Republican, for governor today on scattered returns from 68 of Kentucky's 120 counties in yesterday's election.

The returns, from 202 of the 4,219 precincts, showed Chandler 28,023 and Swepe 19,805 votes and represented a cross section of the state.

Tasting the sweetest of victory scored in the assembly elections in the empire state, Republican leaders said today they saw a turn in the tide for 1936, but Democratic chiefs sharply disputed this.

The party that failed to re-elect Hoover in 1932 topped its numerous scattered victories in state and municipal elections yesterday by gaining control of the assembly in President Roosevelt's home state of New York.

It also elected mayors in Philadelphia and Cleveland, increased its majority in the New Jersey assembly and retained control of the state senate there.

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Republicans Regain Control of New York Assembly—New York City Democrats Retain 2 Congress Seats

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Democrats Also Score.
On the other hand, Democrats retained two seats in congress from New York City, ran up a record majority in the assembly of Hudson in their stronghold of Hudson county, N. J., won overwhelming approval of Democratic Governor Herbert H. Lehman's \$55,000,000 state relief bond issue in New York, and looked toward Kentucky today to count the Democratic gubernatorial nominee the winner.

Two persons were killed and two wounded in shooting and cutting affairs in Kentucky, and there were some fist fights in Philadelphia.

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GERMANY TO HALT SUPPLIES PASSING TO ITALIAN HANDS

League of Nations Informed Help Will Be Given in Enforcing Economic Sanctions to Halt Struggle

The communication said this re-selling to belligerents was supposedly at a large profit and "the government therefore proposes shortly to issue a decree to render such speculation impossible."

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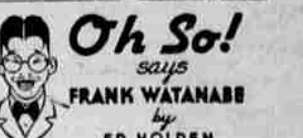
