A protest to the change in zones was filed with the planning commission by Leland S. Brophy.

The protest set forth that extension of the brewing plant would cause a decrease in the value of residential property in the neighborhood.

Asked if his company would make further extensions in future, Mr. Gebauer replied that he did not know, but indicated that the plant would be enlarged if conditions made it advisable.

'HOLY JOES' SUPPORT LATOURETTE TO TAKE DEMO COMMITTEESHIP

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Howard Latourette, speaker of the Oregon legislature, was forwarded today for national Democratic committee to succeed Congressman Walter M. Pierce.

A group of 12 young Democratic representatives, four of whom are from Multnomah county, met last night to consider party business.

Out of the meeting came the boost for Latourette, who is of Portland, and Congressman Pierce, who indicated he would not seek re-election as congressman, is supporting Will Peterson of Pendleton for the position, it was understood.

matter of settlement was taken up with the bondholders. Holders of all but \$20,000 of the bonds agreed to accept a cash settlement of 40 cents on the dollar and the legal step now being taken in federal court is to compel the holders of the \$20,000 of bonds to accept a settlement.

Mr. Arnsperger explained. If the court orders a settlement, they will be paid 37 cents on the dollar in new serial bonds paying 4 per cent interest. He said. The old bonds paid 6 per cent interest.

The bonds of those who agreed voluntarily to the cash settlement were deposited with the RFC as collateral and if the court approves the readjustment plan the RFC loan will be paid with the new serial bonds and the old bonds cancelled.

Mr. Arnsperger stated. The RFC and those who did not accept the cash settlement would then be the only holders of the irrigation district securities, he added.

In explaining the financial difficulties of the irrigation district, Mr. Arnsperger pointed out that the system was built and financed in the period immediately after the world war when values were grossly inflated.

When the depression came the financial condition of the district was so bad that it was necessary to collect assessments because of general economic conditions, Mr. Arnsperger said.

The picture now is viewed by Mr. Arnsperger as being more cheerful. Revenues have increased materially in the past two years, crops are bringing higher prices and economic conditions in general are much improved, he said.

The final step in the complete success of the Medford irrigation district is the debt readjustment now pending, he declared.

ITALIANS UNTOUCHED BY MEAT RESTRICTION

ROME, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The "sanctions" restriction went into effect in Italy yesterday, but the fascist organization machine seemed to have slipped a cog in its enforcement.

The butcher shops were closed, but meat and poultry were on sale on the open markets which do much food retailing throughout the nation.

The price of foreign newspapers went up 20 per cent today in Rome. News dealers said they could not explain the increase, but thought it was intended to discourage purchase of such publications.

The price of gasoline went up sharply, from 85 cents to \$1.08 a gallon.

INDUSTRY AND LABOR TO TALK NRA FUTURE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—George L. Berry, NRA coordinator for industrial cooperation, announced today that the industry and labor to confer with him on December 9 relative to the future of NRA.

At a press conference, he said some 3,000 members of industry had replied to a previous letter asking if they would attend such a conference and that 73 per cent answered favorably, four unfavorably and 23 non-committally.

Berry disclosed that some large industries, including automobile manufacturers, had declined to come.

\$100,000 HIGHWAY JOB IN MCGINNISVILLE AREA

The two points are 11 1/2 miles apart and the route is to be a new location made between Sheridan and Valley Junction.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Governor Martin announced today he had received official word from WPA officials that the Oregon flax project, calling for scutching and retting plants, had been approved and \$58,825 had been allotted for the program.

Object to Barges

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Six Pacific Northwest railroads objected today to the Interstate Commerce commission proposed operation of a barge line on the Columbia and Snake rivers, Wash., by the Island Navigation company.
