

Outstanding CCC Scrappers of District on Elks Fight Card Tonight

CURRAN TANGLES WITH SUPECK IN MAIN ENCOUNTER

Seven Bouts Slated for Edification of Lodgemen and Friends — Trip to Portland Reward for Winners

Civilian conservation corps boxers, intent on a trip to Portland November 19 and 20, were pouring out of the hills today and clamoring for a chance to appear on tonight's Elks-CCC fight card at the Elks temple.

With seven bouts slated for tonight's card, the district officers will be able to match the outstanding scrappers from 21 camps in the area. A record breaking crowd is expected to pack the lodge room where the fights are held. Elks and their friends are invited to attend.

Tiger Curran, 156, Oak Knoll's flashy boy who has yet to lose a bout here, will tangle with Bill Supek, 157, Coos Head, in the main event on the card. Supek was runner-up for the district middleweight title and assumed the crown when Rudy Lantz left the district.

A number of other important matches have been slated, with the right to represent this district in the Portland tournament at stake. Eight men from the Medford district will make the trip to the International Far Western Diamond Belt Amateur championships November 19 and 20.

Several new men who arrived with new companies in the district will be given a chance to show their wares. Among them is the Pocatello, Idaho, district lightweight champion, who has asked for a chance at Jess Savickie, South Fork's Frankenstein.

John J. Roslin, 117, lightning boxer from Camp Prescott, will make his debut on the card against Nat Lombardo, 118, Oregon Caves. Lombardo defeated Harold Freedman of Upper Rogue on the last card.

Harry Clifton, 125, Agness, will meet Steve Granzky, 129, China Flats in another important bout. Howard Gupstall 148, Gasquet, will tangle with Joe Dispensa, 143, Oregon Caves. The balance of the bouts were being arranged today, all of the men being given rigid physical examinations before being placed on the card.

CHEMAWA INVADES TIGERS' BAILIWICK ON ARMISTICE DAY

Bowman Drilling Squad Hard for Set-to With Traditional Foes—Kunzman Sustains Leg Injury

With a team declared to be on a par with last year's squad, the Chemawa Indians will take the warpath against the Medford Tigers on Vancouver field Monday, Armistice day. In what is expected to be a breaker for the locals. Breathers are always dangerous business, for it is there that the opportunity for an upset comes.

Last year the Medford squad trampled the Chemawas by the lopsided count of 47-0, and many expect them to repeat that performance Monday. Early season reports that the Indians were going to be weaker than in years have been reversed, however, and the Redskins have turned in scrappy performances against up-state teams, including the Salem Vikings, who defeated them 20-8.

Indians eager for game.

Two weeks ago a rumor went the rounds that the Chemawas, led by the large scores Medford had been running up, were considering cancelling their appearance here. This report drew indignant denial from school authorities and with the denial came a warning that nothing would warm the coxles of the Indian heart as would a win over the undefeated and untied Tigers, rampaging toward a state title.

Coach Bowman has not let his men consider the game already won, but has been drilling them hard all week on pass offense and defense, and straight football, with an hour of hard scrimmage last night.

The second squad will probably carry the mail through the last part of the game, always providing that the varsity has run up a substantial lead. Several players, injured earlier in the season, are back and may get into the fray.

Kasuo Maruyama, little Japanese halfback who went out several weeks ago with a chipped ankle bone, is back in harness, as is Orford, tackle, who got a bad bone bruise on his shin which put him in bed for a week. Phaley, end, who received a broken rib and four cracked ones in the Klamath Falls game, will be out of active scrimmage for several weeks, but is working out in uniform to keep in condition. He should be back for the Ashland game on Thanksgiving if not for the Grants Pass tilt on the 24th.

Kunzman Injured.

Kunzman, star end, went down in practice last night with a torn sinovial membrane in his knee, and will not dress for the Chemawa encounter. Bowman announced today, The knee injury is not serious if Kunzman stays out of practice for several days, but another crack on the injured spot might result in water on the knee. It was said, Ray Eittinger, lanky tackle and end, will cover Kunzman's assignments in the game. Kunzman will be back for the game on November 16, if an opponent is signed for that date.
