CALIFORNIA BEARS ON SPOT AGAIN IN MEETING HUSKIES

Washington Outfit Considered by Many Strongest Western Eleven—Trojans Underdog Against Indians

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—(P)—California's Golden Bears, undefeated and untied in seven games, will go "on the spot" for the second straight week tomorrow as they attempt to hold their precarious leadership in the bustling race for western football honors.

Opinion on the day's major contest is evenly divided, with California a local favorite at 10 to 8 and the Huskies liked by about the same odds in the northwest.

Against an iron-clad Bear defense which has yielded nine points to opponents in seven games the Huskies will throw probably the highest geared offense in northwest football history.

About 60,000 fans, the bay region's biggest crowd of the season, is expected to turn out for the contest. Advance ticket sales have been heavy.

Coach Howard Jones' Trojans, paying the piper with interest for their years of dancing atop the football world, seemed headed for another unceremonious dumping at the hands of Stanford. With Bobby Grayson ready to go at fullback, few critics doubt the Indians pack too many guns for the faltering Trojans.

UCLA PLAYER ADMITS ALIAS USED TO GAIN PLACE ON GRID TEAM

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The "hidden identity" play—fastest of football's sideline thrills—was ended today with the terse admission of the erstwhile star fullback of the University of California at Los Angeles.

I am Clois Francis (Shorty) Key. His brief statement after four days of silence dissolved the mystery about his identity and history, revealed he was using an alias R. E. (Ted) Key, borrowed credentials, and that he was ineligible, having played two years at the Texas School of Mines.

Dean Earl J. Miller withheld Key from the California game last Saturday despite his assertion "Honest, I'm Ted" and went to Texas to investigate the puzzling Key genealogy which disclosed a baffling assortment of R. E. (Ted) Keys.

After the 26-year-old Vernon, Tex. youth disclosed the truth, his father, James D. Key, a nightwatchman admitted he had shrouded the boy's identity in order that he might get an education here.


