One Woman and Her Work

By Rev. J. W. Angell To the Editor: Recently, while on a visit to Los Angeles, I had the privilege—

To hold and to fill most effectively "the greatest woman-filled position in the world"; to do in her life "the greatest work of any woman"; to command "a mightier army than the great nations can muster"; to sweep away and uplift masses thousands by her impassioned eloquence; to fill ten minutes after the doors are opened the large auditoriums of a great city; to administer and wisely direct the manifold operations of the Salvation Army "in 30 countries and provinces and in 87 languages and dialects," as it carries to the poor and needy, the ailing and lost and outcast of the world, the gospel of salvation and new life in Christ, with its constant world-wide ministry of love and help and uplift for fallen humanity—such, in part only, is the mission and work of Evangeline Booth, the head and "general" of the Salvation Army. And she does this at 70, with all the vim and vigor and snap and superb health of less than 50!—tirelessly, magnificently, unselfishly.

I have just had the great privilege of seeing and hearing her in the wonderful meetings of the western congress of the Salvation Army at Los Angeles, including the 11 west coast and mountain states and Hawaii; and I want to share it with you who read this.

At the great welcome meeting, from which thousands were turned away for lack of room, she was personally introduced by former President Hoover and the mayor of Los Angeles, and was greeted with personal messages from all the governors of these 11 states and Hawaii.

As Mr. Hoover entered the auditorium and again later when he rose for his speech, he was greeted with tremendous and prolonged applause; which was even greater as she entered and when she began to speak. Imagine, then, the power and significance of "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name . . . and Crown Him Lord of All," when sung as it then was in such a setting and by masses thousands, led by a chorus of 200 chosen voices, by a great organ, and by large Army bands in full play!

Born 70 years ago, on Christmas day, just when "her inspired father, William Booth, started his modest mission in the slums of London (from Salvation Army of today), Evangeline Booth, at the age of 13, reverently dedicated herself to this her father's and her Master's work, and resolved "to live only for God." She has never wavered, never for one moment doubt-

ed her mission or her call from God to this work, her life, her destiny, chosen of God for her. Her vitality is amazing. She will leave home at 8 a. m., and donate in her car as she rides, she confers with members of her staff, oversees the work of her office and of the Army out in the world; she finds time to write books, besides the almost endless messages and "orders" from her general. She is in close touch with every detail of international administration, and already has the work planned for two years ahead, including an international congress in London in 1937.

Besides the religious and rescue and relief work of the Salvation Army, more or less familiar to many, there is the far-flung work in prisons and for discharged prisoners; the care of lodging houses, soup kitchens, children's homes and day nurseries, employment bureaus, medical dispensaries, training schools, etc., all over the world. Through its ministrations in foreign lands, whole tribes of degraded outcast people have been redeemed and reclaimed by the power of God from lives of crime as a tribal occupation, to become true Christians and law-abiding citizens. Directing all this, under God, is Evangeline Booth, general of the Salvation Army.

Every moment of her six days in Los Angeles was crowded full with conferences, private interviews, public meetings and addresses, and business sessions of the 12-state Army congress, at which she presided, and she came there straight from a similar event of almost two weeks in Canada, and left again within an hour after closing the Los Angeles congress.

How does she do it all? How can she speak for nearly 75 countries, two or three times a day, sometimes—and hold her audiences with intent interest, and lead them to action? Whence has she—as a speaker and in her generalship and her own personality—this eloquence unmeasured, and the tenderness and winsomeness of woman, coupled with the authority and force of masculine leadership? Where does she get her "great organizing ability and her brilliant executive talent, transfused with woman's compassion, understanding and mercy"? How can she lead and direct so magnificently and successfully so great a multitude of workers?

She herself will tell you, as did Paul the Apostle: "It is from Him whom I am and whom also I serve!" Personifying in herself, as she does, the spirit and purpose and work of the Salvation Army in its mission of hope and help and salvation for lost men and women—she and her father before her are tremendous examples of what God can do with and through anyone who wholly yielded and devoted to Him in life.
