CANNERY IN HOME INCREASES PACK

A small but lusty infant is the Willis Stiehl Canning company of Rogue River, packers of the increasingly popular "Well-Pak" brand of solid pack tomatoes. Started in 1930 as a home venture, putting out 20 cases that year, the little cannery has grown until now, in 1935, they have an output of 80 cases.

All of the work in the cannery is now done by the Stiehl family in their home, but they are planning on erecting a building for the operations next year. The excellence of the pack has caused a demand far exceeding the supply, and the three Medford stores, which handle the entire output, have indicated a desire to have a larger volume next year. Stiehl hopes to employ a battery of helpers before many more seasons roll around.

SURVEY SHOWS 69 HOUSE VACANCIES IN CITY LIMITS

The Medford Realty board has just completed a thorough survey of the housing situation in this city. The results of which are very interesting. With the assistance of officials from the local post office accurate and reliable information was secured covering the number of vacant dwellings, extent of the "doubling-up" of families and the character of vacant houses.

Out of 2617 dwelling units in Medford there were, at the time the survey was made, only 69 vacancies. Of this number 57 were single family houses, while the remaining 12 were apartments. The classification of the vacancies is as follows: Number in good livable condition 28, fair condition 14, and in poor and undesirable condition 27. Of these 28 desirable vacancies it was found that approximately 50 per cent were being held vacant during the time they were on the market for sale, while several were already rented, but were awaiting occupancy by the new tenant. This proves conclusively that there are very few desirable houses for rent in Medford and that the property owner who will put his rent property in good condition can be assured of a tenant.

It is also interesting to note that there are now 98 families in Medford who are doubling-up with other families, and that if each of these should attempt to secure a house for itself it would not be possible to accommodate them.

The results of these conditions are increased rents and increased desire for home ownership. With the increase of rents it is now cheaper to own your own home than to rent. A survey conducted by the National Association of Real Estate Boards made in the major cities of the United States reveals almost the identical situation as found in Medford.
