

ROARING TROPICAL STORM DESTROYS BIMINI



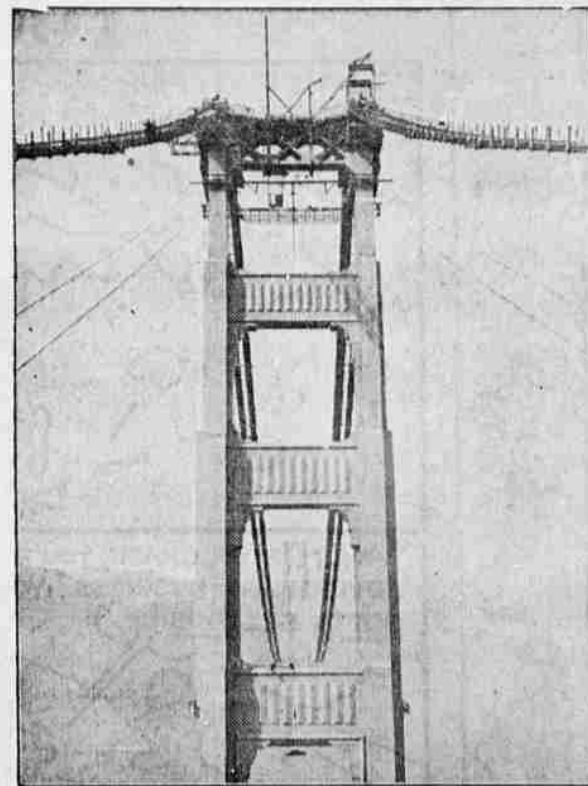

KING CALLED BACK TO GREECE



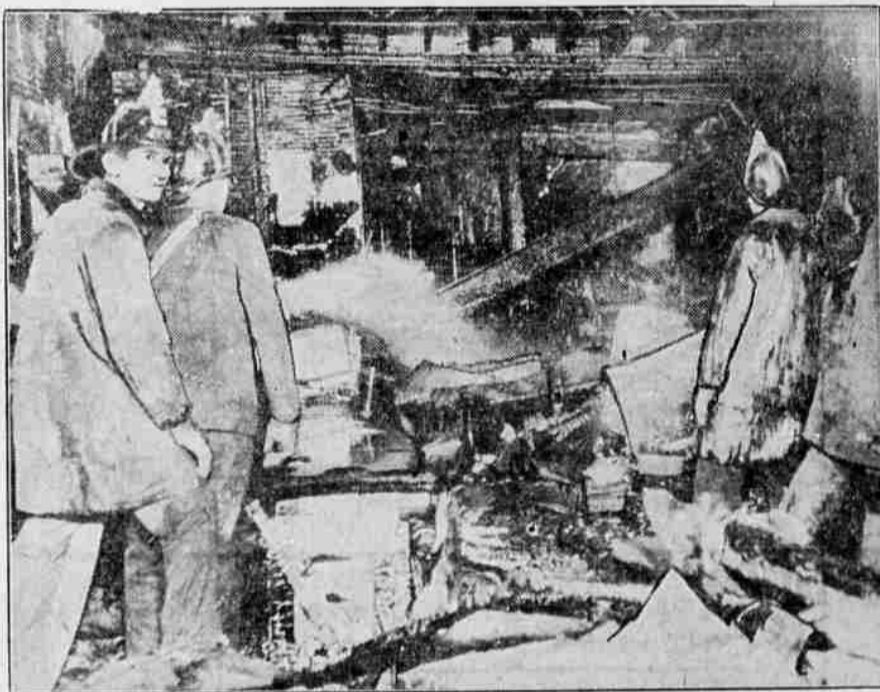

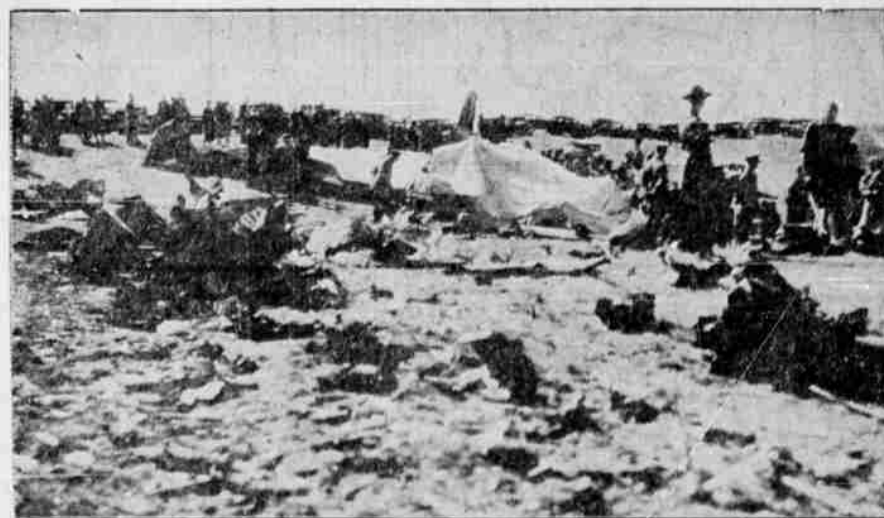

MRS. HAUPTMANN HEARS DECISION



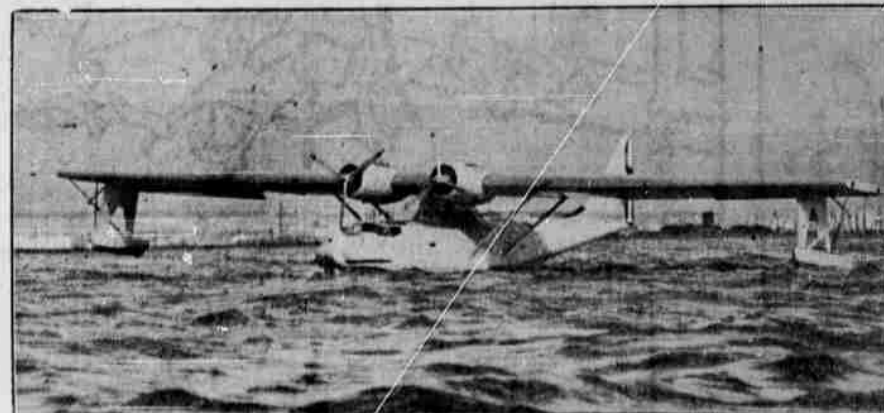

NAVY SEAPLANE LANDS FROM RECORD FLIGHT



The navy's newest seaplane XP3Y-1 is pictured taxiing along the waters of San Francisco bay just after alighting at Alameda from a 3,387-mile flight from Panama which is believed to have set a new world's non-stop record for seaplanes. The big craft, commanded by Lieut. Comm. Kniffer McGinnis and carrying a crew of five others, made the flight in 34 hours and 51 minutes.
