

Oregon Defeats Staters 13 to 0; Stiners 'Shock Troops' Too Weak

RIRDAN'S PUNTS, REGAINED FUMBLE, AIDS TO WEBFEET

O. S. C. Air Attack Checked Gray Gives Run Thrill—Callison Crew Gets Breaks

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—University of Oregon ran its home-field winning streak to seven complete seasons today by defeating Oregon State college, 13 to 0, in their annual "civil war."

The Webfoots started their two first half touchdowns drives when they recovered Oregon State fumbles.

Coach Lon Stiner surprised the 15,000 fans by starting an entire second string of "shock troops." He left the reserves in the game until Oregon scored once and threatened again. The Beaver regulars then couldn't pull out of the hole, and themselves yielded another touchdown.

Rirdan's punts, which averaged 42.2 yards, put Oregon State in the hole time and again, and one of his long boots paved the way to the second touchdown. He thumped the ball over Safety Joe Gray's head and Oregon recovered on the Oregon State 18-yard line. A speedy drive netted a touchdown.

Even that doesn't tell all the story of Rirdan's punting. Once he sent a 59-yard punt out of bounds on Oregon State's one-foot line and a few minutes later punted out on the Beaver one-yard line.

Thrills Provided The Beavers, particularly Joy Gray, gave the spectators plenty of thrills with their wide-open plays and laterals. However, several long gains were called back when Oregon State's intended laterals were thrown forward.

The Beavers threatened in the second period when they drove to the Oregon 33, and again in the third quarter when they drove to the Webfoots 26. Both times the Oregon pass defense functioned beautifully and the threats ended.

Oregon had the ball on the Oregon State two-yard line, second down and goal to go when the game ended.

Oregon State received, and before a third of the spectators realized the second string was playing, Skinner intercepted Mountain's fumble and Oregon's drive started on the Beaver 35-yard line.

Braddock Recovers Michak fumbled as he drove to a first down, but Braddock recovered and made five more to the Oregon State 15. Coach Stiner and his regulars sat silently on bench and the spectators wondered when the regulars would go in. An end-around by Rirdan and backs by Braddock and Michak produced a first down on the Oregon State 10.

On the 50-yard line he was stopped again, pivoted, reversed his field and lateraled to Fisher, a slow moving tackle, who was in the open, and gained five more before going down.

"Might Have Been" A fast-starting man in Fisher's place probably would have been loose for a touchdown.

Oregon State took the air time and again, sometimes with success, but Coach Prink Callison's men seldom were forced twice in succession on the Beaver tosets.

Oregon State never got a real break. Once Gray gained 12 yards and lateraled to a teammate for 25 more, but the play was called back for an off-side.

CHEMAWA TO PLAY TIGERS TOMORROW, HOPE FOR UPSET

The Chemawa Indians, after getting away to a shaky start early in the season, will invade Van Scoyoc field tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock in an effort to revive their battered prestige against the undefeated and untied Medford Tigers.

While reports have put the Indians in the underdog position, they will be much more dangerous than their early season record would indicate, for they have been coming forward dangerously in their last few games.

Coach Bowman of Medford, after watching his charges skin out a win over Klamath Falls by a precarious five points because of workmen against passes, has been drilling his charges hard all week on this phase of the warfare, and expects to present an impregnable wall for the Indian offense attack. A win for Chemawa would trip the Tiger march on the state championship, so the Medford mentor is taking no chances on an upset.

If the Indian offense and defense prove strong, the entire first string of the Red and Black will remain in the fray, but if the Chemawa forward wall crumbles, as has most forward walls faced this year, the razzle-dazzle second string will get a chance to get into action, building up reserve strength for the coming jousts with Myrtle Point, Grants Pass and Ashland.

Taking no chances on the possibility of an unorthodox defense on the part of the Redskins, Bowman has drilled his first, second and third teams on how to perform against any kind of an unbalanced or short-manned line, and fears little difficulty in that department.

The starting lineup for the Tigers will probably be: Right end, Grow; right tackle, Blair; right guard, Dickinson; center, Stocks; left guard, Baker; left tackle, Sante; left end, B. Ettinger; quarterback, B. Ettinger; half back, Lewis; right half, Smith; fullback, Sakrakis.

ANETS TOUCHDOWN GIVES FROSH WIN

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—It's all over again, as usual, between the Frosh and Rook football teams.

The University of Oregon Ducksling appeared just a little more at home in last night's ankle-deep mud and defeated the Oregon State Beaverslings, 6 to 0. In their previous game the Oregon State Babes won, 9 to 0.

One fast-opening hole at tackle through which Anet dashed 16 yards for a touchdown, enabled the Frosh to win. A roughing penalty gave the Frosh the ball on the enemy's 17-yard line, and Fullback Dave Gammon picked up a yard just before Anet made the winning run.

The Rooks gained 186 yards, 31 of them from passes, while the Frosh gained only 67 yards and didn't throw a pass. But their percentage game worked. The Rooks made seven first downs and the Frosh one.

Twice they held the Rooks on downs in scoring territory. The Rooks shot an incomplete pass over the goal line on another futile foray.

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CALIFORNIA WINS FROM HUSKY, 14-0; NIP FINAL DRIVE

Golden Bears Capitalize Breaks for First Score—Blower Star of Contest

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Berkeley, Calif., Nov. 9.—(AP)—California's dreams of an undefeated season and the bid to represent the west in the Rose Bowl came a step closer to reality today when the highest Golden Bear eleven in years smashed out a 14 to 0 victory over University of Washington's Huskies.

As in several earlier games, the Bears gave a convincing demonstration of heads up football by snatching a "break" and in five plays converting it into a touchdown. Herwig California center, made the first score possible when he recovered fumbled ball that Byron Haines, Washington right half, dropped after signaling for a fair catch. Hedwig fell on the oval on the Huskies 25-yard line. Three times Floyd Blower, California's sub left half, smashed into the Husky line to slither off tackles for a total of 15 yards.

With the ball on the ten yard marker, Blower whipped a pass to Quarterback Mow who made the catch over the goal line. Sparks, sub left end, converted.

Early in the third period, California banged over the second touchdown to clinch victory. It followed a 50-yard advance, with Blower throwing a 29-yard pass to Sparks, for the score. The touchdown play provided extra thrills as Blower had dropped the ball, scooped it up and rifled it away, as the Washington Giants charged in on him. Again Sparks kicked the extra point.

Each side missed field goal attempts. As the game neared its end, Washington put on a closing drive that had the crowd on edge. For sixty yards, the Huskies advanced, on plunges and a lateral pass that netted 21 yards, but at the 15-yard line, California's defense came into its own, and the Bears took possession to make ten yards on a run as the final gun sounded.

The victory proved a costly one for California, leading the Pacific coast conference with four victories, as Jack Brittingham, star right end, suffered a knee injury which may keep him out of uniform for the rest of the season.

MYRTLE PT. SIGNS FOR TIGER BATTLE

The undefeated and untied Medford football team that has run up an average of 30 and a half points in each of its four games this year, will tangle with the Myrtle Point seagulls here next Saturday in an effort to eliminate one of the six undefeated and untied teams in the state. It was announced last night by Principal C. G. Smith of Medford.

Myrtle Point swalloped Coquille Friday 13 to 0, and Marshfield and North Bend in previous encounters. Coach Bill Bowerman of Medford has invited Eugene, Milton-Freewater and Pendleton to play in Medford on that date but his offers have been refused for various reasons. Myrtle Point was promised the game after the others had turned it down, providing they won their Friday game with Coquille.

The Medford team averages 192½ pounds, average age being exactly 17 years. Five of the first string are sophomores, only two seniors. Only four on the team ever played a game before this year, only two were regulars last season. Two members of the first team are only 18 years old, playing their first year.

Myrtle Creek Victor MYRTLE POINT, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—The Myrtle Point high school football team remained in the undefeated class today. The Bobcats yesterday defeated Coquille, 13 to 0, to win the championship of Coos county and remain in the running for state honors.

NORTHWESTERN IS SURPRISE VICTOR OVER NOTRE DAME

Trojans Stave Off Defeat Till Finish—Grayson Puts Ball in Scoring Zone.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Notre Dame's new wonder team of football, perched on the highest peak since the days of its immortal Knute Rockne, fell into the ruins of an almost unbelievable 14 to 7 defeat today.

Northwestern, a team that hasn't been able to win more than one Big Ten game this season and a university that hasn't boasted of a triumph over the fighting Irish in 34 long years, accomplished the stunning upset amidst a setting of rain and twilight before 35,000 spectators.

The Wildcats came through with a copyright Notre Dame rally, trailing by 7 points—the Wildcats rushed back to tie the score in the second period, added another touchdown in the fourth, and then stood like a Gibraltar as the fighting Irish fought back with the same fury that brought them from nowhere to victory over Ohio State a week ago.

Heap skirted his right end behind brilliant blocking to score the winning touchdown. Duvall kicked his second point after touchdown and the damage was done.

Bill Shakespeare gave the Notre Dame fans their final big thrill, as he raced 48 yards a minute later to Northwestern's 10, but the Wildcats held.

IDAHO LOSES VIA FLUKE TOUCHDOWN

MOSECO, Idaho, Nov. 9.—(AP)—A flip of fortune on the first scrimmage play of the game gave the alert Washington State college eleven a 6 to 0 victory over Idaho in a game which kept the chilled crowd thawed with thrills.

Rodger Dougherty, the W. S. C. fullback from Portland, fell on the bounding ball behind the goal line on a half pass from the Idaho center to halfback Theron Ward. The kick for point failed.

Ward received the opening kickoff on the 10-yard line and ran it to the 27. The ball slipped wildly past him on the first play, bounding fifteen feet as he tried to pick it up on the two-yard line. It bounded into the end zone with Dougherty on it.

The game was replete with fumbles and scoring threats. A free-for-all between rosters of the two schools added excitement between halves and gave police a 10-minute job.

MOSCRIPT'S TOE, AS GAME NEARS END, GIVES CARDS WIN

Trojans Stave Off Defeat Till Finish—Grayson Puts Ball in Scoring Zone.

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, LOS ANGELES, Nov. 9.—(AP)—A field goal by Jim (Monk) Moscrip in the last 40 seconds of play enabled Stanford to defeat Southern California, 3 to 0, today. Just when 40,000 spectators had decided neither team could score in a week of Saturdays.

Stanford, heavily favored to win by ten or more points, saw more than 29 minutes of the game was without a payoff.

Stanford lost the ball on downs on Southern California's one-yard line in the middle of the third quarter and could not get going again until the game progressed to its last five minutes. The winners then completed their first pass and this finally led to the field goal by the sharpshooter, Moscrip. The rifle shot was aimed from the 15-yard line.

Southern California, playing its best football of an indifferent season, was alert throughout and smart quick-kicks three times sent the visitors back on their heels.

Stanford's running game was effective except when the final touchdown punch was needed. The Indians negotiated 16 first downs and gained 220 yards rushing before they could score.

Southern California, too, had its chances to score but could not deliver the pinch. The Trojans lost the ball on downs on Stanford's 11-yard line in the first period and moved to the three-yard line in the second quarter.

With the defense functioning so well neither team could show a consistent offense, until the contest was on its last legs, the game seemed about to end in a scoreless tie when Stanford suddenly leaped into the threatening position with a complete end pass. Six previous passing attempts had resulted in failure, but this time Bobby Grayson passed to Keith, stopping on Southern California's 35-yard line, a gain of 11 yards.

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Grayson then went back to pass again but could not find a receiver, so he ran with the ball and, catching the Trojans napping, galloped to the nine-yard line, where he was chased out of bounds. He then moved on to the six, but the next play lost a yard and Moscrip was called on to get the three points—quite enough to win the game.

Stanford had missed a great chance to score in the third period when the Indians went from their own 20-yard line to Southern California's one before losing the ball.

ALBANY FINALLY TASTES VICTORY

ALBANY, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Albany college, national "defeatist" champion, and its four-year veteran, Jack Nichols, realized their football dreams today and celebrated their first victory in four years.

The Albany Pirates crushed Pacific College of Newberg, Ore., 19 to 0, last night in a driving rain.

Jack Nichols, who played in all 28 of Albany's consecutive losses and the tie game that followed, tasted victory for the first time since his high school days.

LAST HALF RALLY GIVES MINNESOTA EDGE OVER IOWA

Trojans Stave Off Defeat Till Finish—Grayson Puts Ball in Scoring Zone.

IOWA CITY, Ia., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Minnesota's mighty football force, stilled for 30 minutes by a furious Iowa offensive, let loose a crushing counter-charge in the second half today to whip the Hawkeyes 13 to 6 in their battle for the Western conference leadership.

Fifty thousand home-coming fans saw the Gopher ride up for a two touchdown rally in the last half after Iowa surprised the Norsemen with a first quarter score.

The Gophers were consistently outplayed in the first half. But they came back at the start of the third period with a crushing line attack to win their third Big Ten game of the season.

George Roscoe, Sheldon Beise and Tuffy Thompson, the burly Gopher backs, were the big features as Minnesota piled up 209 yards from scrimmage, while Iowa collected 103 yards by rushing.

One Simmons, the Iowa negro star, could not break through for any of his celebrated touchdown sprints, but the Texas lad was a constant threat.

After scouring California, Oregon and Washington for suitable material to appear on the next Medford wrestling card, Promoter Mack Lillard telephoned yesterday from Klamath Falls, advising that he has an array of talent seldom seen here, to present on Monday, November 18.

The headliner will probably feature Pete Belcastro, the Wood Avalanche, who just returned from a barnstorming tour of Mexico, and Lea Wolfe, limber-limbed Texan, whom Lillard found fighting main event bouts in Los Angeles and persuaded to come north.

In the second half of the double main event Toots Estes, who also was lurking in Los Angeles, will probably face Gold Hill's mean marine, Bob Kennaston. In the opener it is possible that Johnny Soos, ever popular Indiana university grappler, will meet an as yet unnamed opponent.

While wrestling in Mexico, Belcastro won 19 out of 20 matches, dropping a one-round decision to Nick Litze, of Los Angeles, rated as one of the toughest wrestlers on the coast.

The fans here are anxious to see Belcastro in action again, and are also anxious to see someone pin back the ears of Kennaston. Several weeks ago Kennaston carried out a win over Estes' brother, Babe, and it is now up to the Hawaii champion to redeem the family honor. Kennaston is much larger than Estes but not nearly so fast.

Ohio State Conquers Chicago, Final Period

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—(AP)—In a blood and thunder thriller, an infuriated Ohio State team came from behind today and fought with all its power to keep its Western conference record unblemished.

Trailing the down-trodden Chicago Maroons, 13 to 0 midway in the third period of their game, the Buckeyes cut loose with a smashing passing drive that resulted in three touchdowns, and a 20 to 13 triumph.

UPSTATE RIVALS OF TIGERS FACE BIG TEST MONDAY

(By the Associated Press) Four of Oregon's six undefeated, untied football teams face their biggest tests of the season in Armistice day grid wars.

Myrtle Point high wound up its regular season without a blemish by defeating Coquille high, 13 to 0, Friday night. Myrtle Point's record is seven wins and 124 points against 6.

Medford high, which has the highest scoring average of any team in the state, appears to have a "breather" game Monday against the Chemawa Indians.

But the other four of the present "big six" of Oregon football will have to fight like mad for what they get, and one is sure to fall.

The most significant encounter is the meeting of the undefeated and untied Pendleton and Milton-Freewater high teams at Milton-Freewater. Pendleton seemed to have an almost imperceptible advantage, but this might be offset if the Buckaroos fall to click as well as on an enemy field.

The Portland classic pits the undefeated, untied Washington high Colonnas against the fast rising, powerful Jefferson high team.

Yale Reserves Rout Stubborn Brown, 20-0
