Wherever Will Rogers was, there was certain to be fun and amusement. He was always doing and saying the unusual—unusual because it was unexpected.

During the filming of "Steamboat Around the Bend," Director John Ford noticed that Will Rogers was missing from the set. He sent out an assistant, who found Rogers in the dressing room rehearsing a chorus of a dozen negroes in the singing of spirituals. Will, who doesn't sing himself, was tilted back in a chair, eyes half closed, listening.

"Mr. Ford needs you right away," the assistant informed him.

"Tell him we're on the last chorus of 'Swing Low, Sweet Chariot,'" cried Will. "When it hits the ground, we'll be right over!"

Will Rogers was once dickering with Amos G. Carter, publisher of the Fort Worth Star Telegram, Fort Worth, Texas, for a reporter's job for his son, Will, Jr. They were discussing the wages the young cub reporter was to receive.

"Tell you what," said Carter. "I'll give the boy his board and room and the regular cub's pay."

"Better not," Will advised. "Just boarding that boy would break you."

COLUMNIST PERRY HIGHLY RATED IN LITERARY HISTORY

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12.—(Sp.)—Arthur Perry, author of "Ye Smudge Pot," is given extensive notice in "History of Oregon Literature," an 800-page book of the press here this week. Several items are quoted from Mr. Perry's famous column, and an article about him by Edison Marshall is given in the chapter, "Oregon Authors About Each Other."

Another Jackson county columnist is also featured—Orange Jacobs, who was editor of the Jacksonville Sentinel in the old days and who wrote clever items for that paper that made him one of the early columnists of Oregon.

There is a sketch of Edison Marshall and a detailed list of his numerous novels.

As a decoration on the literary map of Oregon that is used for end papers is a drawing of the old church at Jacksonville. One of the selections is a stage journey from Jacksonville to Portland in the '60s written by Joseph Gaston, the historian.

"History of Oregon Literature" is a comprehensive survey from the time of the Indians, with chapters on the literature of the explorers, missionaries and pioneers, and with full treatment of the novelists, historians, poets, columnists and descriptive writers of the present. The book consists of 42 chapters and is extensively illustrated with manuscripts, title pages, photographs of sculpture, and crayon drawings by Bernard Hinshaw of Eugene.

The author is Alfred Powers, dean of the general extension division of the state system of higher education, who spent several years gathering material for the book. He was recently appointed state director of writing and research for the works program administration. He gave an address at the recent GCO conference held in Medford.

The publisher is the Metropolitan Press of Portland.

REDEMPTION IS NAZARENE TOPIC

Speaking Sunday night from the topic: "Weighing the Merits of Redemption," Fred M. Weatherford, pastor-evangelist, preaching from the Nazarene pulpit, took his text from Isaiah 1-18, "Come now and let us reason together, saith the Lord: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool."

The Butte Falls amount, listed as in excess of the six per cent limitation, is listed as due to tax payments not coming in, needed repairs to the gymnasium and high school the coming year, and for payment of outstanding school warrants.

ROBERTS AWARDED \$5,343 JUDGMENT IN MINE ACCOUNT

In a memorandum decision handed down by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly of Douglas county, in the suit of George M. Roberts and other against W. E. (Jed) Hittson, the Lucky 13 Mining company and the First National bank, Roberts is awarded a judgment of \$5,343.97 against Hittson and is held to be half owner of the Ruby mining claims.

Other findings of the memorandum were:

That the so-called "Hittson shaft" was located on the Ruby mining claims; that Hittson trespassed on the Ruby claim and removed therefrom in excess of \$15,000; and that Hittson secured a controlling interest in the "Lucky 13" mine and then refused to proceed against himself.

The memorandum also holds that Hittson removed \$12,209.81 from the Ruby claim, which was divided between Hittson, George Lewis and Tom Splitzer. After deductions for U. S. mint assays and services, Roberts is awarded a judgment for \$5,343.97, and the same amount awarded to the "Lucky 13" Mining company. Costs are also assessed against Hittson.

Roberts and other stockholders of the Ruby claims filed suit against Hittson for an accounting. Hearing of the suit was held last July. The First National bank was named as a defendant because it was the depository of Hittson.

The "Lucky 13" and "Ruby" claims are located in Siskiyou county in the Blue Ledge district, just over the Oregon-California state line. The two mines overlap and are practically the same mine.

Judge Wimberly holds that he has no jurisdiction over the question of title to the mine claims, as they are located in Siskiyou county, California.

A suit to decide the title question has been filed in superior court of Siskiyou county and is scheduled to be heard at Yreka next Monday.

The case, highly involved, attracted wide attention among mining men of southern Oregon and northern California last winter when reports of the find were first made public.

decision could be expected a few weeks thereafter.

Sometimes, however, criminal cases are advanced to expedite a decision. Rosenkrans said today he would not oppose that action.

The Hauptman petition contended that the jury was "unduly influenced" by the daily presence of Colonel Lindbergh at the trial, by the "inflammatory" summation of state counsel, and by "hysterical mob spirit."

These points previously had been raised in an unsuccessful appeal to New Jersey's highest tribunal, the court of errors and appeals.

S. P. Authorized to Abandon 11 Miles

EUGENE, Nov. 12.—(Sp.)—Official word has been received here that the Interstate commerce commission has authorized the Southern Pacific to abandon eleven miles of the west side line between Cheshire and the junction of the line with the Coos bay branch three miles west of Eugene.

This road, extending from Corvallis to Eugene, was built more than 25 years ago by Ay Welch, railroad promoter, and later sold to the Southern Pacific.
