### ITALIAN FORCES READY TO TAKE CITY OF HARAR

ROME, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The fall of the strategic Ethiopian city of Harar was reported imminent by Italian correspondents on the east African front today.

After a pitched battle in the Fafan river area announced yesterday, Colonel Maletti's column in south Ethiopia was engaged in sweeping the region clear of ambushes and raiders.

The correspondents said Maletti with his "Flying Dubata," was already so far advanced in the high valley of the Fafan that he was "only 40 kilometers (about 25 miles) from his immediate objective."

This movement may occupy several days, it was said, giving time for reinforcements to come up.

They reported that the regular Ethiopian defenders of the territory around Harar had fallen back in disorder before Maletti's advance.
