Public Awakening To Health Menace Hand Dishwasher

The public is just awakening to the menace to public health in dish washing, says C. D. Bean, head of C. D. Bean, Inc.

"Doesn't it strike you as peculiar that we think that we always have considered the tooth brush a personal thing; that we sterilize the clinical thermometer before placing it in the child's mouth, and yet we think nothing of putting unsterilized knives, forks and spoons in our mouths three times a day?"

"But the health angle of the electric dish washer is not its only advantage. It is a time saver, a wife saver and a money saver as well. Dish washing is just an endless, thankless task that has to be done three times a day.

"Moreover, bending over a steaming dishpan costs more women their charm and dispositions than any other task in housework. Washing dishes in the old-fashioned way leaves hands in terrible condition.

"Then, there is the breakage problem. In homes where there are maids, dishes are broken with seeming regularity during the washing. Even if the housewife washes her own dishes, she is apt to break a good dish or a glass every week or so. Count this up at the end of the year and you will find it is a tidy sum. Occasional breakage may seem an insignificant thing, but in total it really amounts to something. An

New Turkey Stuffing Has Approval of Food Expert

 1/4 cup diced onion
 1 cup cooked and drained rice (wild rice is excellent)
 1 tablespoon poultry seasoning
 1/2 cup stock from cooked giblets (chopped giblets may be included)
 1 cup oysters or sliced mushrooms (may be omitted)
 Salt and pepper to taste

Place the crushed Shredded Wheat Biscuits and the parsley in a mixing bowl. Heat the butter to bubbling in a skillet, add the diced celery and onion and cook gently until the onion is soft and yellow. If mushrooms are included they may also be sautéed in the butter mixture. Stir the rice into the sautéed onion and celery mixture. Add to the Shredded Wheat. Add the oysters (if included), poultry seasoning, and stock from the giblets. Season to taste with salt and pepper, and mix thoroughly. Stuff the fowl, and proceed with the roasting.

Prune Muffins
 4 Shredded Wheat Biscuits, rolled fine
 1 cup flour

 1 egg
 1/2 cup chopped dry prunes

Into Shredded Wheat crumbs sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Add milk and well beaten egg. Fold in the prunes. Pour into well-greased muffin pans and bake 20-25 minutes in hot oven (425 degrees F.) Makes 12 muffins.

long stretches. Speed is considered an assurance of presidential protection from such things as happened in Miami prior to Mr. Roosevelt's inauguration.

The escorts, in order to assure ample safety at lower speed, have now adopted a policy of clearing the roads of traffic. For instance, they cleared Riverside Drive on his journey into New York.

Note—A friend of the Roosevelt family says, at least half facetiously, that the president is trying to set a good example to his sons, whose motorizing antics have caused some apprehensions around the White House.

Larger holding companies are supposed to have spent considerable money on long distance telephone calls lately. At least they apparently have managed to get together privately on what to do about registering under the holding companies act, by deciding not to do it.

You will very likely learn on the morning of December 1 that most of the holding companies have failed to register and have filed equity proceedings in their various federal district courts to restrain the securities and exchange commission from enforcing penalties against them. That is the procedure favored by the best holding company lawyers.

One large New England company will probably leave the pack and register, but only a few others are expected to follow that course.

A stiffening attitude toward Democratic non-conformists, such as Ohio's Davey and Georgia's Talmadge, has been faintly perceptible here among new deal politicians since the Kentucky election.

There is some quiet talk about heading down more heavily on all miscreants, now that the Kentucky situation turned out very well. This talk may be premature, and not completely authoritative, but there is no question about the new dealers wearing their Kentucky feathers jauntily.

Those who anticipate rougher times for the bad boys are pointing to the current income tax procedure against Governor Davey.

Another unnoticed inner reaction after the Kentucky election was the swelling of governmental waste budgets with Laffoon commissions of Kentucky colonels and admirals. There are supposed to have been 60 members of Governor Laffoon's all-inclusive military society in a single government department. Since the primary and election these credentials have been disappearing from office walls and desks at a rate sufficient to indicate a political trend.

Foremost of Laffoon's colonels was Presidential Secretary MacIntyre. He is still addressed as Colonel, but the commission is understood to have been hidden.

If anyone doubts that the 1936 presidential campaign has begun, Mr. Roosevelt's speaking engagement list will furnish proof to the contrary. It now includes speeches at Harvard, Chicago, Atlanta, Vincennes, Ind., and Dallas, during the next six months. And the list is yet incomplete.
