

### SNOWBOUND PAIR LOST ON DIAMOND LAKE ROAD SAVED

Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Griffith  
Of Los Angeles, After  
Chilly Night In Auto Rescued  
By Snow Crew.

A thrilling and entirely fortuitous rescue of a Los Angeles couple snowbound on the Diamond lake highway was told yesterday by W. L. Jones, construction superintendent of the United States forest service.

The couple was saved only by the circumstance that some of the supplies of the Diamond lake CCC camp were left behind when the camp was closed for the winter a few weeks ago.

The couple identified themselves as Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Griffith, operators of the Lee Hotel at 822 West 6th street, Los Angeles.

The two travelers were homeward bound after making a 5,000 mile tour of the northwest. They decided after breakfast Thursday morning to motor to Crater lake but at a junction they became confused and veered off on the Diamond lake highway.

Being unfamiliar with conditions in the region, they continued until their car, a Buick sedan, got stuck in 18 inches of snow.

Overtaken by darkness, the tourists decided to remain in the car over night and look for assistance the next morning. There was no heater in the automobile but holes were cut in the panel under instrument board to permit the circulation of heat from the engine. The fan belt was removed and the engine run all night to provide warmth. Snow fell throughout the night.

Early the next morning the couple set out on foot to seek assistance, not realizing that the nearest house was in Union Creek, 19 miles distant, or that the highway was seldom used at this time of year.

After trudging through the deep snow for three miles the couple collapsed, overcome by hunger and exhaustion.

At that precise moment a snowplow came along. On it were Mr. Jones, Fred Middlebush, operator of the plow, Grant Neely, supervising mechanic of the forest service, and Lieut. Henry A. Barris of the CCC. They were plowing their way to the Diamond lake CCC camp to get the remnants of property that had to be left when the camp was closed for the winter a few weeks ago. It was only because of an unexpected early fall of snow that the supplies were left behind, it was explained, and it was believed that Mr. and Mrs. Griffith owed their lives to that circumstance.

The men quickly rushed to the assistance of the exhausted tourists and revived them with alcoholic stimulants. Their car was pulled out of the snow and they were taken to Mrs. Mary Grive's inn at Prospect. They reached the resort shortly after noon on Friday and there they were given lunch, the first food they had had since Tuesday morning.

When the lost tourists were revived they became hysterical with joy, Mr. Jones related. They were so excited they were unable to give a coherent account of their experience for some time, he said.

After they had rested at the Prospect resort the couple set out again in the car, saying they were going to Medford for the night but a check of all hotels in Medford and Ashland yesterday disclosed that Mr. and Mrs. Griffith had not registered. It was assumed that instead of stopping in this vicinity for the night they had continued toward California.

Triphon, president of the California Bee Breeders association, and entitled "Some Problems Relating to the Queen and Package Business," was read to the convention. Mr. Triphon being unable to attend because of illness in his family, Prof. F. C. Reimer of the southern Oregon experimental station gave a talk on the "Need and Value of Bees in Producing Satisfactory Fruit Crops."

George W. Nichols, Jr., of Talent was the retiring president of the association.
