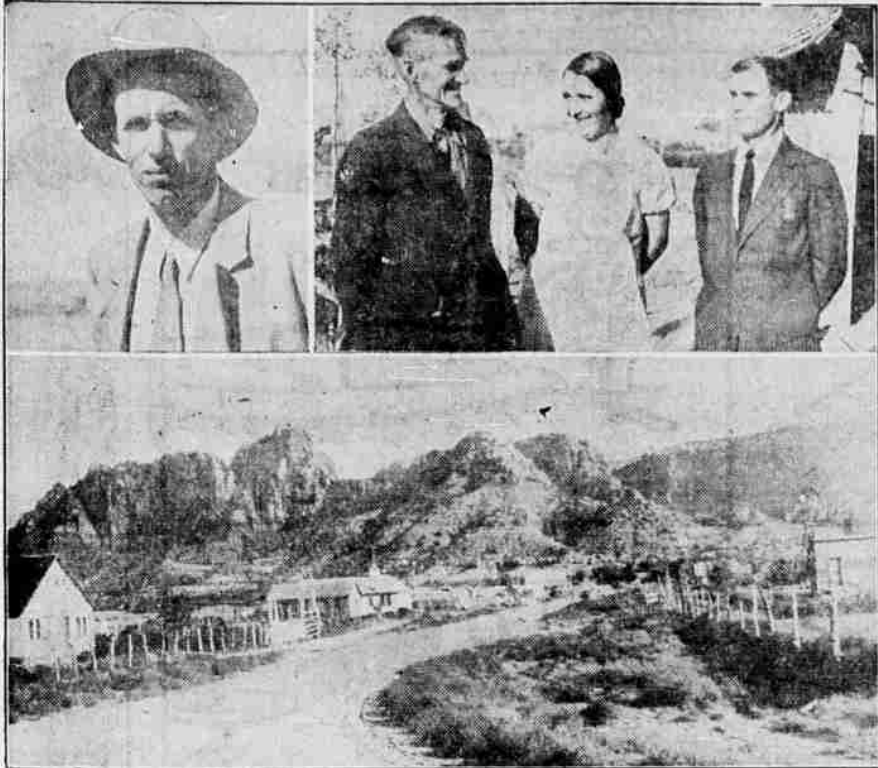


POLYGAMISTS FACE TRIAL IN ARIZONA

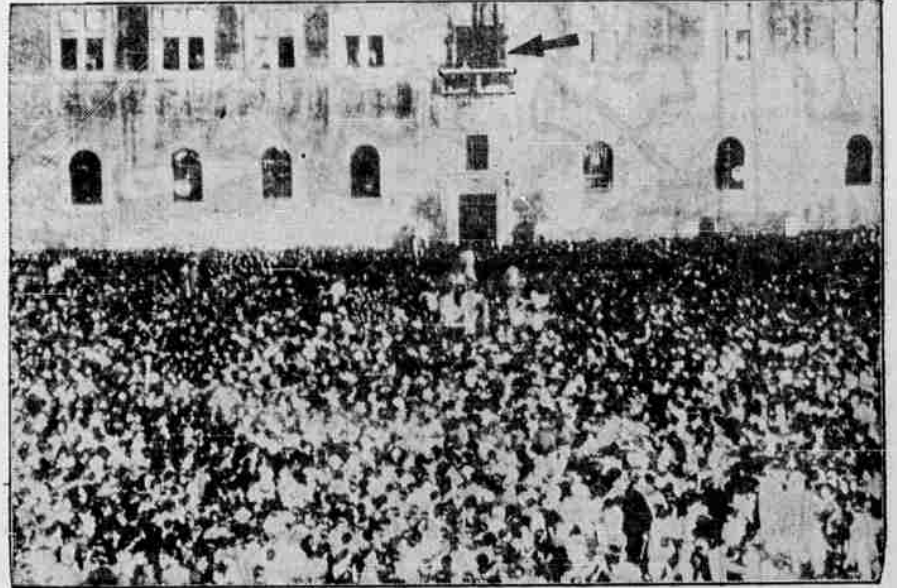


ITALIANS MAY DRIVE SOUTH FROM HARRAR

MUSSOLINI HURLS GAUNTLET IN FIERY SPEECH

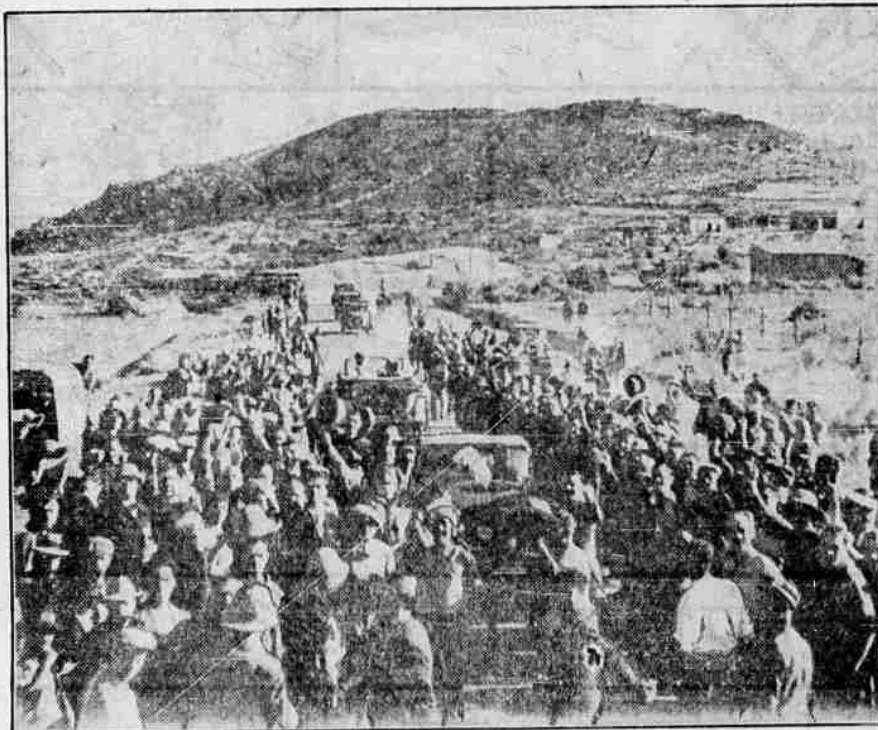

SMILES, TEARS MARK ACQUITTAL

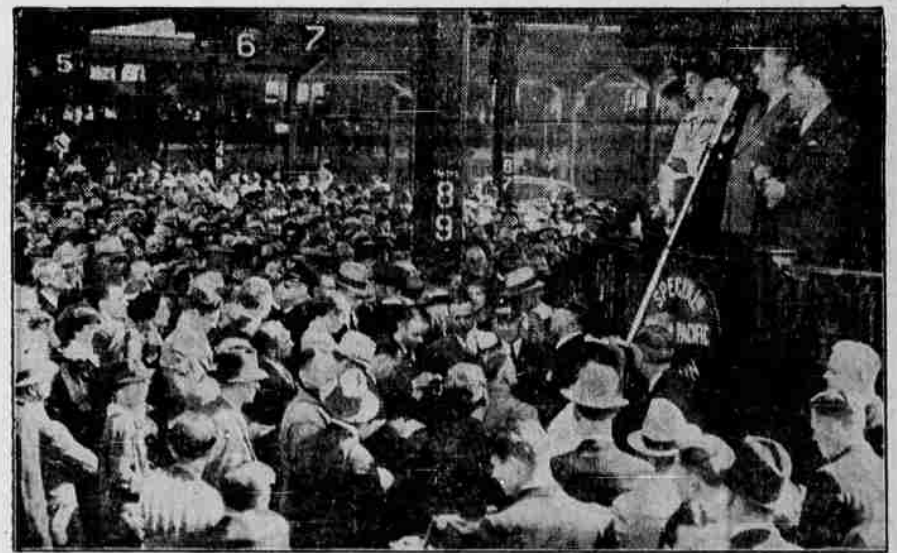

CAPITALISTS ATTEND STEEL MEETING

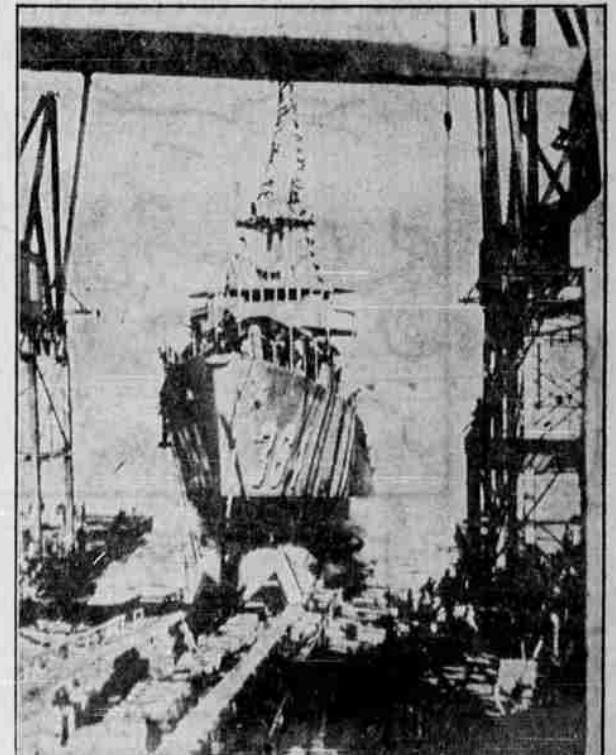
