

FOUR ACRES RAKED BY 28 FIRES OVER CRATER LK. AREA

TAYLOR VISIONS LARGER GROUNDS FOR STATE HOUSE

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Nov. 16.—(Sp.)—A review of the 1934 forest fire season in Crater Lake national park reveals a marked efficiency in present-day fire-fighting methods. Although 28 fires occurred in the Crater Lake area, only four acres were burned, including a minimum amount of timber.

Records, compiled by Chief Ranger J. Carlisle Croch, show that 25 of the 28 blazes were caused by lightning, two by debris burning and one by a smoker, indicating that Nature in her electrical moods was the main enemy of the forest lands. The fires were widely distributed over the 250 square miles of the park and emphasized the importance of the motorway or fire-road system threading the area providing accessibility to all parts of the park by motor, which otherwise could have been reached only by foot.

The new state capitol may eventually have a larger area than the old site of about seven acres.

This is the view of Representative Glenn O. Taylor who was back at his deputy United States marshal's office in federal building here yesterday after attending the special session of the legislature that approved a compromise measure for the erection of the new capitol on the old site.

"Personally, I should have liked additional ground," Mr. Taylor said, "but it is generally overlooked that the measure provides for the old site plus any gifts of land that might be made."

"Wilson park, which is owned by the city of Salem, is immediately to the west of the capitol site and it is possible that this land, comprising about six acres, may be given to the state by the city. The capitol site would then have about 13 acres."

"The house, Mr. Taylor said, had to choose between the old site and Candalaria heights, no other choice being presented to it. The house, he stated, was opposed to the heights location because of its remoteness and the cost of improving and modernizing it."

Gift For The White House!



Deliver to the White House — one 1250-pound cheese!

Five-year-old Dorothy Jean Jadin, dressed in the fashion of 1800, wraps up a mammoth Wisconsin cheese and ties a big red, white and blue bow on it to be presented to the President during National Cheese Week, November 10 to 16.

The huge cheese is a duplicate in size and form of America's first mammoth presented to Thomas Jefferson in 1802 by the Republican Ladies of Massachusetts. Wisconsin's gift will be presented at the White House November 14, in a ceremony identical, as nearly as possible, with the one in 1802.

Drawn by six white horses, on a white sleigh, the giant cheese will proceed through the streets of Washington to the front door of the White House, marking the climax of Cheese Week activities.

The 1250-pound mammoth is the gift of the National Cheese Institute whose membership comprises all major members of the industry. The National committeeman from Wisconsin, as an intermediary between the White House and the National Cheese Institute, worked out preliminary details for the delivery of the cheese to the President through Marvin H. McIntyre, assistant secretary to the President. The Cheese for the White House, made from more than 12,000 pounds of the finest grade Wisconsin milk, was made in Weyauwega, Waupaca County, Wisconsin, by Raymond J. Patton, a master cheesemaker.

relief should be confined to cash allowances to these authorities to the extent that they are unable to provide for their own funds."

3. "The spending for visionary and un-American experiments should be stopped."

4. "This horde of political bureaucracy should be rooted out."

5. "The provision of the constitution requiring that expenditures should be only in accordance with appropriations actually made by law should be obeyed. And they should be made for specific purposes."

6. "The budget should be balanced, not by taxes, but by reduction of follies."

7. "The futile purchase of foreign silver should be stopped."

8. "The gold standard should be re-established, even on the new basis."

9. "The act authorizing the president to inflate the currency should be repealed."

10. "The administration should give and keep a pledge to the country that there will be no further juggling of the currency and no further experiments with credit inflation."

11. "Confidence in the validity of promises of the government should be restored."

"Economic security, social security, or any other security cannot be found without first restoring these primary policies of government," Hoover asserted.

Turning to the course of monetary affairs under the Roosevelt administration, the former president said:

"The dose of inflation, now injected into our national bloodstream by the new deal is already three or four times as great as that of 1927."

"They say also it can be controlled. But will the politically controlled reserve system prove any more successful? Stated in its mildest form, this is gambling with the fate of a nation."

"Should these controls fail, this democracy will not survive the shock."

Save The Good
Mr. Hoover titled his address "The expenditures imposed upon the people by the new economic planning, its consequences, and some remedies it requires." He said at the outset that he was not criticizing all that has been done in Washington and that "whatever is good should be continued."

He noted that opponents of the economic planning were divided into two groups. One, he said, feels that such a catch-word power "that incite passion for power, the insidious end of which is the destruction of liberty and the rise of the regimented state. The other

group holds that "the new 'national planning' is an attempt of a collegiate oligarchy to sanctify by a phrase a muddle of uncoordinated reckless adventures in government — flavored with unctuous claims to monopoly in devotion to their fellow men."

"My own conclusion," he said, "is that the new 'national planning' contains any or all these elements, depending upon which new dealer is doing the planning for the day."

The only consistency he could find in the various branches of the planning was that each "has the habit of carefree scattering of public money."
