

PLAN EXTENSIVE IMPROVEMENT OF CARGILL COURT

Work on the general remodeling and improvement of the Cargill apartment house at Sixth and Ivy streets, will start about December 15. The Vermont Loan and Trust company of Spokane, Wash., yesterday commissioned F. C. Clark, architect of this city, to draw the plans and let the contract for the work. The work will cost approximately \$18,000.

Architect Clark said today that he expected to have the plans drawn and the contract let in about two weeks. The job is anticipated to take six weeks to complete. Tenants of the apartment have been notified to vacate by December 15, Clark said.

The general plans call for a modern apartment house with stucco exterior finish, a new heating plant and plumbing throughout, new water system, enlarged apartments, new kitchen, new electrical wiring, a new sixth street entrance and a general overhauling.

Architect Clark also announces he has completed plans for construction of a duplex apartment on North Riverside avenue, by Virgil Hawley of the Hawley Transfer Co. Work will start within the next week or ten days.

Arrangements have also been completed for remodeling of the upper floor of the Jackson County Building and Loan association, by that organization. Office suites will be built, to be occupied by Dr. E. W. Hedges. Work will start at once and be ready for occupancy by January 1.

ONE DAY CONVENTION WILL BE HELD FRIDAY AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The fellowship supper at 6 p. m. will be one of the high points in the one-day convention to be held Friday at the First Christian church. Here the members of the team and the leaders of the church get together in a session of informal good fellowship. The subject under discussion at the

dinner hour will be Christian stewardship. The speakers will be Virgil A. Sly and Mrs. Walter Menzies, a missionary to India.

Members of the local Disciples of Christ in 34 states and provinces in the United States and Canada are attending the one-day conventions. This is the 13th annual series of the meetings. They are sponsored by United Promotion, the general promotional agency of the Disciples of Christ.

These one-day conventions last year reached 60,000 persons representing 2,166 churches. Indications for this year are that there will be an even greater attendance.

A cafeteria lunch will be served at noon.

Virgil A. Sly is a national director of the United Christian Missionary Society of the Disciples of Christ. He is responsible for the promotion of the special days of the Sunday schools, and supervises the production and distribution of all the materials for their observance.

Mr. Sly promotes the annual one-day conventions of the United society, the total attendance of which is more than 60,000. This is the greatest convention of the Disciples of Christ.

When Mr. and Mrs. Menzies first went to India they spent a year at Mahoba, where they helped with the orphanage there. The following year they went to Rath, where they were engaged in evangelistic and village work.

It has been at Pendra Road that Mr. and Mrs. Menzies have gained recognition as outstanding missionaries. Here they have developed community welfare projects which have won great praise from mission and government authorities alike. There is one of the most effective pieces of agricultural work in the entire country where it is estimated that 80,000 people have never been thoroughly satisfied at a single meal.

LINCOLN ELLSWORTH ANTARCTIC HOP FAILS

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The New York Times and the North American Newspaper alliance reported Lincoln Ellsworth was back at his base ship the Wyatt Earp, today, after an unsuccessful attempt to fly across the Antarctic continent.

The Ellsworth plans were forced to turn back because of a broken fuel gauge.

With Herbert Hollock-Kenyon as pilot, Ellsworth had attempted to fly 2,140 miles from the Weddell sea to the Ross sea.

GEOGRAPHY GOES GAY IN BOOK OF COMIC CARTOONS

SAN FRANCISCO.—(UP)—One of the largest single cartooning jobs, requiring four years' work, has been completed with the result that geography has gone gay.

More than 10,000 individual cartoons were drawn by Ruth Taylor in making a series of maps of the United States featuring people at work, animals, industries and odd items of history. They are published in book form.

"Geography doesn't have to be dull," reasoned Miss Taylor. "All you have to do is take a few liberties with the map and have some fun with it."

She did that. Sandy wastes in the southwest became tiny sand piles with a baby having a big time with a toy shovel. Miss Taylor, a San Francisco cartoonist, started drawing while a co-ed at Stanford university. Later she became a newspaper reporter and eventually a commercial artist. Her first step into cartography was seven years ago and since that time she admits she never has been without a cartoon map.

One idea was retained throughout the comic map work, Miss Taylor explained. It was to exaggerate the outstanding features of each district and to forget the commonplace. Yet she retained enough balance to give children and adults an accurate conception of every state in the Union.

HOMESTAKE MINE PAYS BIG RETURN

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—(UP)—Reflecting the unprecedented prosperity of gold mining companies, due to the high price of gold, Homestake Gold Mining company, largest in the United States, today declared a "special extra" dividend of \$20 per share.

The \$20 payment, in addition to the company's regular \$1 monthly dividend for November and a \$2 extra dividend for the same month, brings returns to investors so far this year to \$53 per share, the highest in the company's history.

Fred T. Eisey, president of Homestake and the American Trust company, said there was nothing unusual in the situation, citing that all gold mining companies are prosperous and that Homestake is well able to make the payments out of earnings and depletion reserve.

The "special extra" dividend is payable December 5 to shareholders of record November 30.

The company's principal properties are at Deal, S. D., and have produced more than \$286,000,000 in gold since discovery in 1876.

KLAMATH SHIPS 500 CARS SPUDS

KLAMATH FALLS, Nov. 21.—(AP) Nearly 500 carloads of potatoes have gone out of this section to the Pacific coast markets since November 1, according to Ross Aubrey, federal inspector.

Some shipments were completed in October but the November movement represents the bulk. Buying has slowed down here considerably and it is expected there will be an average of about a dozen cars a day until the crop is exhausted.

After the jump to the vicinity of \$2 during the recent cold snap, the price has dropped back to around \$1.25. While many farmers suffered heavy individual losses, the potato income in general has been greater this year, due to higher bidding to offset the damage in the field.

ISLE OFF MEXICO SEEN AS REFUGE FOR TAXED STARS

HOLLYWOOD.—(UP)—A Mexican island in the Pacific, off the coast of Lower California, has been proposed as a residence for heavily taxed residents of Hollywood. Like the famous Isle of Sark in the English channel, owned by Mrs. Robert Hathaway and upon which residents pay no taxes, this Pacific island may serve as a refuge for those who wish to retain a greater share of their earnings.

The first of the stars to be approached was Joel McCrea. A telephone call came to the Samuel Goldwyn studios, where McCrea was starring opposite Miriam Hopkins in "Splendor," offering him a "co-operative partnership" in the new island empire.

"The plan," McCrea said, "is to buy the island outright from the Mexican government, including complete sovereignty of it, with only an annual title to the government."

"The idea is that movie stars who buy a partnership will reside there seven months a year, fishing, hunting, swimming, writing, making it their permanent home, and will work in Hollywood the remaining five months."

However, McCrea seems unlikely to lead any exodus. He was born in Hollywood.
