RUSSIAN CLAIMS STRATO RECORD

MOSCOW, Nov. 22—(AP)—Soviet Test Pilot Vladimir Kokinaki said today he set a new world altitude record for airplanes by ascending 47,818 feet, or slightly more than nine miles.

The present official record was established by Italian Commander Renato Donati, who reached 47,354 feet (8,96 miles) in a flight from Rome April 11, 1934.

The instruments in Kokinaki's open single-motored biplane were examined after his 62-minute flight by a commission of Soviet experts who confirmed the flier's claims.

OREGON AIRPORT PLANS APPROVED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—(AP)—The air commerce bureau today certified feasibility of a long list of airport projects proposed for inclusion in the works progress program.

The projects still must be approved by WPA, President Roosevelt and Comptroller General J. R. McCarl, before state WPA directors are authorized to include them in state programs.

They included: Oregon: Pendleton, construction of asphalt surface, relocating and rock filling runways, extending rock base to cover present unprotected areas in three main runways \$37,289.
