

Roosevelt Two to One Favorite for Election

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 NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—(UP)—Today's betting odds, quoted by Ryan & Company, Wall street commission-ers, gave President Roosevelt the same two to one odds favoring his renomi-nation and reelection as carried on the chief executive the past two weeks.

SCHLITZ SPENDS VAST AMOUNT TO REMODEL PLANT

The Joseph Schlitz Brewing Co. of Milwaukee, Wis., has announced that between now and the end of next year it would spend well over \$1,000,000 in plant renovation, additions and new equipment.

Storage capacity will be brought back to the all-time peak levels estab-lished in 1914. The material in-crease in yearly output will benefit growth of barley and other ingredi-ents going into the manufacture of beer, will provide jobs in construction and plant renovation and will eventu-ally increase employment at the plant proper.

Currently, Schlitz employs about 1,200, the present season being con-sidered a slack production period. The largest single item in the ex-pansion program thus far announced is an order for \$400,000 worth of glass lined beer storage tanks, awarded last week to the A. O. Smith corporation, out of a field of eight nationally prominent bidders.

The new storage building will be six stories high, although inside there will be only three floors, the inter-mediate tanks to be serviced from cat-walks suspended from the ceiling. It is no longer necessary to design floors in brewery buildings to carry the con-siderable load from filled tanks. With Smith tanks, supported entirely from the beams, it is possible to transfer tank loads to the structural beams of a building.

The buildings will be cork insulat-ed throughout and cooled through refrig-eration, not air conditioned, to main-tain a temperature of 34 degrees. Another part of the Schlitz pro-gram includes the installation of beer canning equipment at a cost of \$100,000. This is already in operation. The new Smith tanks, ranging in

diameter up to 11 feet and in length up to 40 feet, are to be installed in January, February and March of next year. With the receipt of the Schlitz order, Smith's glass beer tank divi-sion is now "sold out" until the mid-dle of April.

27 CENTS PAID FOR TURKS HERE

Rogue River valley turkeys reached the highest price of several years yesterday, when one buying concern paid 27 cents per pound, according to County Agent Robert G. Fowler.

Turkeys from this section for the Thanksgiving trade are being shipped out by express and truck, chiefly for the coast markets. The shipments will reach their peak Monday and Tuesday of next week.

Bulk of the local turkey crop, ac-cording to the county agent, is being held for the Christmas trade.

MEAT ANIMAL HAULER RUNS AFOUL OF LAW

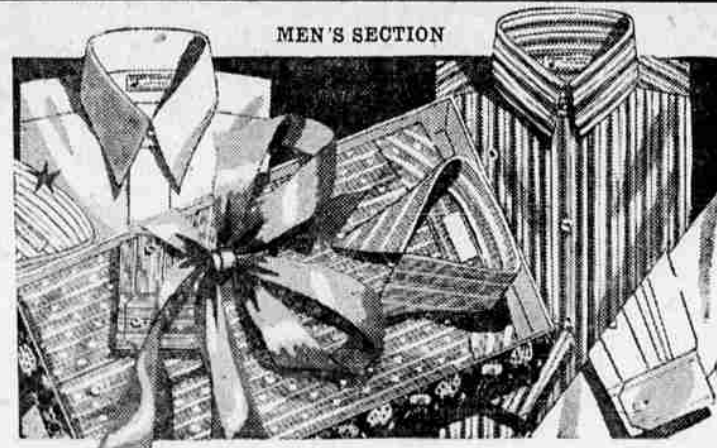
