

CORRESPONDENT IN HAZARDOUS FLIGHT OVER WAR FRONTS

Population of Daggah Bur Flees City When Plane Sighted — Impossible to Land in Forbidding Area

(Editor's note: James A. Mills, veteran Associated Press foreign staff writer, was the first American newspaperman to fly over the southern front in the Italo-Ethiopian war. In the following dispatch he describes the dramatic trip.)

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 22.—(AP)—I have just completed a 700-mile flight over the southern front, penetrating two-thirds of the way into Ogdien province right to the battle lines and south to Daggah Bur.

During the outgoing and return flights, my plane paralleled Emperor Haile Selassie's giant, single-motored ship for parts of the journey, while he was making his first visit to the war zone.

Ras Nashu, Ethiopian commander-in-chief on the southern front, and his aide, Wehbi Pascha, former general of the Turkish imperial army and the danger of being shot down by Italians. I flew over Gorrabel, which the Italians occupy, flying sufficiently high to outdistance Italian anti-aircraft fire.

Gorrabel Bombed Daily

From there, I flew to Daggah Bur, 150 miles northeast of Gorrabel, which is bombed daily by the Italians, and thence to Jijiga, 100 miles farther to the northeast and general headquarters for the Ethiopian southern armies.

The population of Daggah Bur, mistaking my plane for an Italian craft, fled the city.

"Your flight is a highly hazardous one," said Ras Nashu, "because the untrained natives know only Italian planes. They will undoubtedly mistake your machine for an enemy plane and may attempt to shoot you down."

"I advise you to fly at the maximum speed of 200 miles an hour, maintaining the utmost height in order to avoid anti-aircraft guns and rifle fire."

Within a half hour I was flying over Daggah Bur, where Dr. Robert W. Hockman has the only American field hospital in Ethiopia.

The stars and stripes fly proudly from Dr. Hockman's tent, warning the Italians that they must refrain from bombing this remote refuge.

Impossible to Land

Owing to the lack of an airfield and the presence of anti-aircraft equipment, it was impossible to land, but I could plainly discern stretcher carriers carrying wounded to Doctor Hockman's hospital, which is now the southernmost outpost of the Ethiopian army.

Flying thence toward Gorrabel, I could discern no large bodies of either Ethiopian or Italian troops. This apparently proved most of the Italian activities thus far have been confined to air bombing and tank attacks.

Indeed, 90 per cent of the wounded in Jijiga and Daggah Bur hospitals consist of air bomb cases, most of them civilians, many of them women.

I found no gas cases whatever, which indicated the allegation that Mussolini was using chlorine or mustard gas was a pure myth.

South of Daggah Bur I was shown fragments of several Italian tanks which the Ethiopians captured and wrecked. The Ethiopians claimed they beheaded all occupants as an example of the fate they said awaited other Italians attempting to rob Ethiopia of its independence.

Inhospitable Land

The whole vast Ogdien war zone is a barren, desolate forbidding waste with only scattering human habitations.

For thousands of square miles, the inhospitable and unproductive African plain is covered with cactus, brush and brambles reminding one of the wildest parts of the western United States.

Everywhere I landed in the eight-hour flight through the war zone, I found unbounded enthusiasm for the emperor.

"Now that we have seen him on the actual battlefield, we know he will be as great in war as in peace and we are sure he will lead us to victory like Menekle," was one expression.

The name of Haile Selassie was on everyone's lips. It was clear that the emperor's visit stimulated the morale of his troops.

All seemed impatient to face the blackshirts.

One hardy warrior said:

"We are tired of the silly air bombing by Italians, which are not a real man's way of fighting. We want to fight the Italians hand-to-hand as real soldiers. That's why we tackled half a dozen tanks armed with machine guns while we had only rifles and swords."

FEWER CONTRACTS SIGNED BY COUNTY WHEAT PRODUCERS

When production control contracts in Jackson county, under the four-year term starting next year, will be "considerable less" than under the one-year term, according to County Agent Robert G. Fowler.

Today is the final date for filing of new contracts, and unless there is a last hour spurt, the number will be less for the 1938-1939 period. In 1935, there were 84 wheat control contracts in the county.

Any decline is attributed by the county agent to the fact that Jackson county wheat growers need their crops for feed, and not to dissatisfaction with AAA provisions.

Establishment of a potato code control committee, in accordance with the potato control code, effective December 1, is the next federal activity to claim the attention of the county agent's office. Preliminary papers covering the potato plan have been received from Washington, D. C.

The potato law provides that any person raising more than five bushels of potatoes is subject to the law.

Most of the potato growers of the county come under this ruling. There are a number of extensive growers in the Central Point district, and many small growers throughout the county.

It is expected that the machinery for the observance and enforcement of potato code will be set up in a few weeks.
