

STATE AUTHORITY DISCUSSES POLIO AT MEETING HERE

Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, Oregon state health officer, arrived here this afternoon from Klamath Falls to confer with Medford physicians regarding infantile paralysis.

Dr. Stricker told The Mail Tribune that an outbreak of infantile paralysis was to be expected in Oregon this year.

While he considered it best that healthy children continue attending school, they should not be permitted to go to any other public place or meeting.

Dr. Stricker advised parents to exercise control over their children. Youngsters should not be permitted to play until they become tired.

There have been 17 or 18 cases of infantile paralysis in Klamath county and nine or ten in Portland.

Dr. Stricker said, with Jackson county, these are the only areas where the disease has been reported in the state, he said.
