

GOUDY RE-ELECTED AS ADMINISTRATOR OF OREGON RELIEF

Permanent County Committees to Be Appointed—Direction of Old Age Pensions Planned in Future

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Homer Goudy of Portland was re-elected administrator of the Oregon relief committee here Tuesday. The committee organized on a permanent basis, in line with enactments at the special legislative session.

Judd Greenman of Vernonia was re-elected chairman and E. R. Bryson of Eugene was again named vice-chairman.

Members of the committee revealed that permanent county committees will be appointed soon, the members to serve at the pleasure of the governor.

The relief organization spent the morning discussing phases of the social security legislation adopted at the special session this month. The committee members interpreted the legislation as directing the state committee to supervise and control the entire state relief work.

The works progress administration has taken over all public works projects in the state.

Mothers' pensions will continue under the administration of the county courts, but old age pension distribution will be directed by the state committee.

Other members of the board who attended today's meeting were Mrs. T. D. Honeyman of Portland, Miss Ceila L. Gavin of The Dalles and Dr. H. L. Benson of Portland.

The committee decided to ask the FEHA for \$217,507 to help carry on direct relief work in Oregon during December. It was explained that while many persons have been taken from the relief rolls by the works progress projects, their first paychecks will be delayed two weeks.

All but two of the SERA projects will terminate tomorrow. The exceptions are the commodity distribution project, and a secretarial program, both regarded as important although small in scope.

At the afternoon session today the relief committee was to meet with a delegation from the office of the secretary of state. Under the new state security legislation, the secretary of state will be the dispensing agency for all relief money.

ASIATIC PARTRIDGES WILL BE ADDED TO WEST'S WILD LIFE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 27.—(UP)—Breeding experiments carried on by the state fish and game commission during the past five years have proved so successful that in a few years a new game bird probably will be thrown open to hunters.

Five Chukker partridges were obtained about five years ago and placed on the Yountville breeding farm. Now there are more than 2,500 of the Asiatic partridges on state game farms. The birds seem to do best in the brush country and do not thrive so well in the valleys.

The Chukker, a bird generally unknown in the United States, is easily recognized by its brown and white feathers, distinguishing it from other breeds of partridge.

The usual nest contains 12 to 15 eggs. Dr. E. C. Moore, president of the commission, says the experimental stage has been passed and it is only a question of time until the state will afford a new lure for sportsmen.

SPANISH CLASSES TO RESUME SOON

J. G. Hunter, instructor of the state adult education project, for which federal funds have been secured, yesterday announced that the classes in Spanish will be resumed in the near future after a temporary layoff since early in May.

Because of a long delay in receiving federal funds with which to continue the work, City School Superintendent E. H. Hedrick is donating a room in the senior high school building in which to hold instructions. A slight charge will be made for each lesson until the federal funds arrive.

Those interested in Spanish will be pleased to know that the opening of the new highway from Nuevo Laredo (Texas) to Mexico City has greatly stimulated interest in the language, Hunter said. Those interested in signing for the course are asked to register at Hedrick's office in the city hall. In order that the class be a success, it will be necessary for at least 20 to register, and it is important that those registering agree to attend regularly, according to Hunter, who pointed out that late registrations tended to disrupt the courses.

Hunter has had wide experience, both in speaking and teaching Spanish.

OLD AGE PENSION PLAN RESTS WITH VOTERS OF STATE

Outcome of Vote January 31 On Sales Tax Seen As Key to State Action—Federal Provision Expected

PORTLAND, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The future of the old age pensions in Oregon was represented by the state relief committee today as resting largely with the voters. They will express themselves January 31 on a sales tax whose entire proceeds would go to old age assistance, discussions by the state relief committee here today revealed.

The sales tax revenue would provide the state's half of the pension funds, while the federal congress authorized the federal government to pay half of the pensions up to \$30 a month.

Expect Federal Provision.
The federal appropriation for the pensions was blocked by Senator Huey Long's filibuster at the last congress, but probably will be made early in the next congress, which convenes in January.

E. R. Bryson, Eugene member of the state relief committee, emphasized that the pension plan—which he preferred to call old-age assistance plan—does not call for a straight \$30 a month pension to all over 65 years of age.

The aid is to be "granted to each individual according to need," Bryson said.

"Many persons may be entitled to \$30 a month, but for some with a home and garden \$30 a month is all out of reason, according to the provisions of the state and federal social security legislation.

Aid Based on Need.
"The enactments provide that all pension assistance be based on actual need."

Committeeman Wilfred Shuholtz of Portland said he felt all over 65 years of age should have \$30 a month pension, whether they need it or not. However, he admitted that such would not be legally possible under provisions of the present enactments.

COMMISSION LOPS LARGE SUMS OFF UTILITY BUDGET

RANDALL FACING RETURN TO PRISON

SALEM, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Frank C. McColloch, public utilities commissioner, today rejected items totaling \$12,100 included in the 1936 budget of the Northwestern Electric company, Portland Gas & Coke company and Pacific Power and Light company.

McColloch held the items should be charged against the surplus to be paid by stockholders, and not against operating expenses.

The commissioner also disallowed salaries of \$8400 paid by each of the companies to Guy W. Talbot, executive, on the grounds that such salaries were retirement pensions.

Budget items rejected, exclusive of Talbot's salaries, included proposed donations to charitable organizations, national security owners association and the United States chamber of commerce.

McColloch held that Talbot performed no executive duties with regard to the active operation of the companies and his services therefore did not contribute to the efficiency of the service rendered to customers.

"While Talbot's salary was perfectly proper corporate expenditure it should not be added on the monthly gas and light bills, but should be paid by the stockholders," McColloch declared.

Regarding the rejection of charitable donations the commissioner said:

"The theory upon which charitable donations are denied as charges to operating expense is that the customer of the companies should be permitted to choose his own charities and not be required to
