### Barbaric Splendor in Craterian Hit



Said to be a new high in spectacular motion picture achievement, "The Last Days of Pompeii" comes Sunday to the Craterian theater, bringing for the first time a sound and slight dramatization of thrilling events in the pleasure-mad Roman resort in the period of its terrifying destruction in A.D. 79.

The story concerns a young blacksmith, who, in twenty years, rises from mediocrity to become the richest and most popular man in Pompeii. When early poverty coats him the lives of his wife and child, he sets out to make money his god. Sacrificing all ideals, he becomes a professional gladiator, slaying for money. Horse-stealing and slave-trading swell his fortunes, and he becomes finally head of the arena, staging spectacles in which thousands are slaughtered for the amusement of a blood-thirsty populace.

Then, although wealthy and powerful, he discovers that he cannot save his beloved adopted son who has transgressed the Roman law and has been sentenced to meet death in the arena.

As the grief-stricken Marcus helplessly watches the boy go down fighting, at the head of a group of slaves pitted against captive barbarians, Nature takes a hand. The earth is convulsed by a shattering earthquake. Vesuvius is seen to strike raining molten death and destruction on a panic-stricken people fighting madly to escape from the flaming trap of crashing ruins.

It is in this hour that Marcus gives his life in atonement for his ruthless career.

Leading male roles in the picture are played by Preston Foster, Alan Hale, Basil Rathbone, John Wood, Louis Calhern, and the boy, David Holt. Other important parts are filled by Dorothy Wilson, Wryley Thrush, Gloria Shea and William V. Wong.
