STATE IS HOLDING ITS OWN IN BACK TAX COLLECTIONS

SALEM, Ore. — (UP) — Oregon is holding its own in tax delinquencies, reported the state tax commission.

By the end of 1935 the total delinquency should be approximately the same as it was at the end of 1934—\$46,000,000, said the commission.

In the past year some seven and three-quarter millions have been collected from old taxes prior to 1934, cutting the old delinquency to \$38,000,000. Current taxes as of October have swelled this to \$54,000,000, but third quarter taxes bring it back to 46 millions again.

The \$54,000,000 delinquency as of October this year was divided as follows: Rolls of 1930 and prior years, \$11,053,979.13; 1931, \$7,160,037.19; 1932, \$9,289,056; 1933-34, \$13,219,491; and for 1934-35, for which not all the taxes have fallen due, \$13,644,845.

The commission estimated that a million dollars would have been collected in the last quarter of this year from 1933-34 and prior years and \$7,000,000 on the current 1934-35 rolls, bringing the estimated balance of delinquencies as of December, 1935, to \$46,058,900.49.

OFFICIALS BALKED BY INDIAN NAMES

WINDOW CREEK (Navajo Capital), Ariz. (UP)—If anyone knows a method of identifying Navajo Indians let him step forward and win undying thanks of officers of the U. S. Indian service. Indian workers admit the problem has them stumped.

"Name please!" When confronted with that query the Navajo may or may not cooperate. Often the Indian will invent a name, or if unusually suspicious may give the name of an enemy.

Result: statistical chaos. Even where no effort is made to deceive the Indian may give any one of several names.

Some years ago the government made an effort to establish a metal tag for identification. The plan failed, as Indians made a joke of it, pooling the tags of families and taking the first one that came to hand when needed. Gambling games were invented with the tags as stakes.

PORTLAND, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Turkey buyers here surveyed a heavy carryover of the Thanksgiving birds today, just as they were about to open their purchases for Christmas.

Many of them blamed the producer for the surplus, contending the growers held off supplies and flooded the market at the last moment. The carryover of hens was not great.

The market today ranged from 14 to 16 cents for live birds, and from 18 to a nominal top of 26 cents in a limited way for selected hens. These were Portland delivery prices.
