ARMY POWER IN FIRST HALF DOOM OF NAVY, 28 TO 6

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 30.—(UP)—For 20 cyclonic minutes Army's gridiron warriors marched through Navy's bewildered ranks today in the mightiest offensive charge in the 45 years' history of the service game. During that devastating display Army covered 80 yards and scored four touchdowns.

The final score was Army 28, Navy 6, with the Middlea salvaging a touchdown in the final period.

The Army thunderbolt struck once in two minutes, twice in five minutes, three in 13 minutes, and four times in 20 minutes. Few teams ever have unleashed a more savage attack than the Cadets did in those first 20 minutes of gridiron drama.

GODDARD STAR OF COUGARS 7-7 TIE WITH ST. MARY'S

KEZAR STADIUM, San Francisco, Nov. 30.—(UP)—Outgained and out-powered for three listless quarters, Washington State's Cougars staged a fighting last period comeback to tie St. Mary's 7 to 7 before a crowd of 15,000 persons here today.

St. Mary's grabbed an early advantage with a second quarter touchdown and conversion, then overpowered the Cougars for another quarter only to fall before the fiercest and deadly passing arm of Ed Goddard, ace Cougar quarterback.

Goddard, a little later, gave the first exhibition of the elusive running form which made him a virtually unanimous all-coast selection, slicing outside tackle and around end for 17 and 13 yard gains.

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PRINCETON WINS ATLANTIC TITLE; BEATS YALE, 38-7

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 30.—(UP)—With revenge in their hearts and magic in their arms and legs, the men of Princeton crushed Yale, 38 to 7 today, to establish themselves as the mightiest 1935 football power on the Atlantic seaboard.

The victory, the most crushing ever administered to the Bulldogs by the Tiger in all the long history of competition, was achieved before 60,000 spectators, and left Princeton, with a perfect record for the season, the standout team of the east, from Maine to Miami.

The game ended on a mad, hysterical note as thousands of Princeton supporters, overjoyed at the revenge of their team on the eleven which spoiled their all-conquering march last season, poured on the field a few minutes before the final whistle and uprooted both goal posts.

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UCLANS DEFEAT IDAHO; TIE CARDS FOR COAST TITLE

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, LOS ANGELES, Nov. 30.—(AP)—University of California at Los Angeles eliminated a phenomenal six years' climb in the Pacific coast conference today by defeating Idaho to gain a tie for the championship with California and Stanford.

Only 7,000 persons saw Coach Bill Spaulding's team take a 13-to-6 victory over a Vandal squad that threatened in every period but could not score until the game was almost over.

The first Bruin touchdown came midway in the second period on a 66-yard run with Chuck Cheshire scoring on a sweep around left end from the nine-yard line.
