LIST PROGRAM FOR OREGON TEACHERS ANNUAL CONCLAVE

Especially Strong Group of Educators Will Be Heard in Convention December 26-28 at Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore.—(Sp1)—An especially strong group of educators has been secured for the annual convention of the Oregon State Teachers' association by Supt. H. W. Adams of Corvallis, president of the association, and his departmental chairmen. The state convention will meet in Portland, December 26, 27, 28. Lecturers for the general assembly are: Dr. Fred J. Kelly, specialist in higher education, United States office of education, Washington, D. C.; Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor, Oregon state system of higher education; Dr. Grayson N. Kefauver, dean of the school of education of Stanford University; and Dr. Edwin A. Lee, superintendent of schools of San Francisco.

Since the teachers of Washington and California have been generous in their offers to assist Oregon in entertaining the National Education association when it meets in Portland next summer, President Adams has selected most of his speakers from these two states.

The general theme for the convention is "Guidance in our Schools." The departmental officers have planned their programs in conformity with the general theme. Miss Jane Barnett of Jennings Lodge, chairman of the kindergarten-primary department, will be her leading speaker. Miss Helen Reynolds of Seattle, Miss Bernice Carter of Corvallis, and Miss Margaret McGrath, president of the Washington Association for Childhood Education, and instructor at the Cheney Normal school.

The chief social event of the convention is the breakfast of the department of classroom teachers. This will be held on Saturday morning. The officers, Fred A. Brainerd of Portland; Mrs. Barbara B. Snyder of St. Helens; Miss Phyllis Rinehart, Grass Valley; Roy E. Pulliam, Brownsville; and Mrs. Clara S. Stone of Houston, have the most interesting program for this breakfast, as well as for their two departmental sessions. High lights: Supt. John P. Cramer of The Dalles, will discuss "Civil service teachers in a state unit." Frederick G. Leasure will tell about the proposed six-year Edison high school for Portland.

W. B. Schnebly of St. Helens, chairman of the department of elementary school principals, will have as his leading speaker, W. Virgil Smith, assistant superintendent of schools of Seattle. Mr. Smith is an authority on guidance, and will

conduct a discussion on this topic for the elementary principals. L. A. King of Oregon City, is chairman of the department of junior high schools. He will also have Mr. Smith lecture in his department on the subject of guidance.

President Elam J. Anderson of Linfield college, chairman of the department of higher education, has arranged for a panel discussion on the general topic "Guidance in Higher Education," to be led by Dr. Kefauver. Taking part in the panel will be Dr. Lee, Dean Karl W. Oatman, Registrar E. Lenson, and a number of other distinguished educators. Dr. Anderson is inviting to this session not only all the faculty members of the colleges and universities of Oregon, but also all administrative men and women in the public schools. Dr. Kelly will conduct a panel discussion in this department on "Present Day Trends in Higher Education." Dean James H. Gilbreath of the University of Oregon will lead the discussion on "New Deals in the Social Science." Dean Willahald Weniger, Oregon State college, will have charge of the section devoted to natural sciences.

One new department has been organized this year, adult education. Kenneth Beach, state supervisor of adult education, is chairman; Mrs. Katherine McRae, county superintendent, Clackamas county, is secretary. W. P. A. will discuss "Education and Recreation Projects Under the W. P. A."

In addition to these mentioned, twenty-five other departments, including phase of school work, have prepared exceptionally valuable programs. The departmental meetings will be held Friday afternoon, December 27, and Saturday morning, December 28. Teachers from every county in Oregon will attend this convention. The attendance will probably exceed 2,500.

The opening day of the convention will be given over to the transaction of business of the association. A number of important reports will be considered at this meeting. Supt. J. T. Longfellow of Oregon City is chairman of the committee which has been making a revision of the Oregon education plan. The committee will also recommend the steps to make the objectives of the plan effective. Other members of this committee are: Supt. T. F. Brumbaugh, The Dalles; Dr. Paul J. Orr, Linfield College, Shannon Grove, Salem; and Mrs. Antonia Crater, Newberg.

A survey of the national movement in education is being conducted by Supt. Arnold L. Grallapp of La Grande. He has assisting him in this survey Miss Kate L. Houck, Eastern Oregon Normal school; Kenneth La Violette, Pendleton; Supt. O. F. Campbell, Enterprise, and Principal Dean Lobaugh, Pendleton high school.

Supt. H. A. Gould of Eugene will present the results of a study on "Teacher participation." His committee has been making a study of teacher organizations in other states, and of educational conditions in Oregon. The purpose will be to recommend ways by which greater service can be rendered to all members. Working on this committee are Supt. J. A. Yeager, Pendleton; Miss Alice Inshell, Corvallis; Supt. C. R. Bowman, Medford; Mrs. Katherine McRae, Oregon City; and Clyde H. Beard, principal of Roseburg high school.

Principal E. D. Towler of Astoria is conducting a two-year study of a state plan for a teacher retirement fund. He will give at the December meeting the results of the first year's study. Working with Mr. Towler on this committee are: Supt. Fred J. Patton, Clatskanie; Principal Stanley D. Eaton, Eugene; Mrs. Dorothy Taylor Rea, principal of Park school, Salem; and Miss Ada McLaughlin, Benson Pre-Vocational school, Portland.

A most interesting feature of the general program this year will be an all-state orchestra and chorus, composed of boys and girls from high schools over the state. Arrangements are in charge of Mrs. Genevieve Baum-Gaussen, Corvallis, and Mrs. Lois T. Campbell, Sheridan.
