The defense has 20 days in which to file a petition for a rehearing and may file a motion for a stay of execution.

RISE OF FASCISM TOLD BY SMITH AT ROTARY MEETING

An interesting discussion of Fascism was presented by C. Glenn Smith at today's meeting of the Medford Rotary club at Hotel Medford. With Mussolini, and the Ethiopian campaign in headlines during recent months, Mr. Smith's analysis of the Fascist system of government was timely and enlightening to the Rotarians and guests.

In introducing his address, Smith reviewed the Italian nationalism of Caesar's time when the Roman empire was in its glory. The gradual lessening of this power and nationalism from that period to the World war was briefly covered, followed by a description of the pronounced disintegration of Italy's centralized government as an aftermath of the war. The rise of the famous Black Shirts and the advent of Il Duce was told by the speaker as a preamble to his interesting discussion of Fascism.

In Italy's unique system of government, which has spread in various degrees to all parts of the world, labor must bow to the authority of the state, Smith explained. In the so-called Corporate state, comprising 22 great corporations and many syndicates made up of allied trades, Mussolini is supreme dictator. The speaker explained how Il Duce dominates the entire political set-up of the Italian government.

The nationalistic educational system upon which the future of Fascism depends, was next explained. This policy of instilling intense militaristic views in the youth of Italy explains, in a great measure, the public acceptance of Mussolini's ambitious campaign in Africa. Italy, the speaker said, is approximately three-fourths the size of California with ten times the population and the government's program for increased population necessitates territorial expansion.

In concluding, Smith contrasted Fascist, Communist and Democratic governments and discussed their relations to capital and labor.

TREE BELT HELP IN WEST AREAS SEEN AS LOCAL

BLOOMINGTON, Ind.—(UP)—Improvement of climate caused by the federal government's 1,000-mile shelter belt of trees in the west will be only local, according to Dr. Stephen S. Visher, Indiana university geographer.

The shelter belt will be somewhat beneficial in reducing wind velocity, but its benefits will not be as great as its advocates claim, Visher believes. A distinct advantage will be seen in the groves and for a few rods to the leeward, Visher said. Improvement in crop yields and in reducing the blowing away of soil in dust storms would be considerable at times just to the leeward of the groves, but almost nil elsewhere in the belt, he forecast.

There is no good evidence that the shelter belt will yield increased rainfall, Visher said. "Somewhat lower average temperature will be caused in the spring and summer, but this will result in a slight decrease in rainfall during these seasons, rather than the increase which has been claimed," the professor pointed out.

"Practically all of the rainfall of the shelter belt states is due to conditions that such belts of small trees could not significantly modify. "A sharp upward sweep of eastward moving winds is necessary to cool the air and produce showers. The tree belt would slightly retard the eastward wind movement, but not enough to increase rainfall perceptibly," he said.

FARM COLONIES TO AID JOBLESS CALLED FAILURE

MONTREAL.—(UP)—"Back-to-the-land" movements adopted in many countries as a means of solving unemployment problems in large cities, are dangerous experiments, according to the conclusion reached by three McGill university professors in a book on "The British Immigrant," written after a careful study of colonization schemes.

The three professors, Dr. Car. A. Dawson, Lloyd G. Reynolds, and Prof. L. C. Marsh, believe that the possibilities of city residents making a success on the land are limited.

"The re-organization of the occupational abilities of mature persons is a long-time process and involves great uncertainty," they assert. "The price is too great from every point of view and it seems most unwise to attempt to reconstitute agriculturists out of persons who have dwelt for many years in urban centers."

FOG IS PREDICTED TO WIN OVER SUN

The fog returned today and so did the sunshine, but the former was slated to win out for the official forecast was for fog tonight and tomorrow, with little change in temperature.

The fog will continue until there is a change in the pressure areas which have been stagnant for more than a week, the weather bureau said. There was a temporary clearing yesterday when a low pressure area started moving in from the coast, but it veered southward and stagnation returned, it was explained.

Planes of United Air Lines were to land at Medford airport this afternoon for the first time since November 28 when fog forced the company to land its ships at Montague, Cal. A shift to the forecast field will be made tonight if the fog blankets the valley again, officials said.
