

WORLD CHAMPION TO GRAPPLE PETE ON COMING CARD

A world championship bout in Medford! That was the announcement today of Mack Lillard, promoter, when he stated that LeRoy McGurk, light heavyweight champion of the world, will meet Pete Belcastro, Pacific coast junior heavyweight champ for the light-heavy title at the Armory Monday night.

Pete, who now weighs 181, will have to drop to 175 pounds for the bout before McGurk will risk his title, but the supple Italian assured Lillard that he can do this easily with a bit of assiduous road work.

McGurk, a graduate of the Oklahoma A. and M. college, was coached and trained by Edward G. Gallagher, coach of the 1928 Olympics wrestling team. While at Oklahoma A. and M., McGurk wrestled on three national collegiate championship teams, and won the semi-final in the Olympics of 1932. He won the western Amateur Athletic Union heavyweight title at St. Louis in 1932.

In August of that year he turned pro, winning his first 37 matches, and losing only to Hugh Nichols, then champ. In March of 1934, he again met Nichols, winning the match and the world title in a bout in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

At 175, McGurk has taken many heavyweight wrestlers. He uses a rolling double wristlock with deadly effect, alternating with the Japanese crab and a shoulder scissor of his own which he calls the "Question Mark."

Pitted against McGurk's many hands will be Belcastro's own peculiar death-lock, introduced here for the first time several weeks ago, his Italian whip lock, and his terrific drop-kick lunge.

In the middle main event will be Toots Kates, who will probably be making his last appearance on the coast before starting east, pitted against Les Wolfe, rangy Texan, using the Australian system of six 10-minute rounds or two falls.

In the curtain raiser will be Frankie Peck, water-front grappler, who will mix with Rex Mobley, Alabama power house who last week took a referee's decision from Belcastro. This bout will also be wrestled under the Australian system.

The defense has 30 days in which to file a petition for a re-hearing and pending this action may ask for a stay of execution, which if granted would delay departure for state prison.

CATHOLICS REGRET DEGREE GIVEN F. R.

BAITMORE, Dec. 4. — (AP) — The Catholic Review says in a current issue that Catholics were expressing "deep regret" at the action of the University of Notre Dame in offering an honorary degree to President Roosevelt.

Monks Albert E. Smith, editor-in-chief, wrote the degree was extended "for no other reason" than "in gratitude for the independence of the Philippine Islands, a Catholic country."

There is "not the slightest reason" to interpret the conferring of the degree "as an endorsement by the University of Notre Dame of the president's policy in respect to Mexico," the article said.

The president accepted Notre Dame's offer of an honorary degree of doctor of laws, to be conferred December 9 at a special convocation at the university at South Bend, Ind.

Wedding Rings Of Royal Pair To Melting Pot

ROME, Dec. 4. — (AP) — King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Elena, a reliable source said today, have sent Premier Mussolini their wedding rings to aid the Italian campaign against sanctions.

The reported action was in line with the plan of 900 of Italy's feminine leaders, who agreed to help in combating sanctions by having women throughout the nation contribute their wedding rings.

no other action was taken and he expected the commission would be in session during the afternoon.

Mrs. Helen Burrell Voorhies of Medford was elected temporary chairman as the nine members went into executive session at their opening conference.

The group, after a visit with Governor Martin who turned over all the data on capitol construction and financing which had been gathered by his office and the board of control, was photographed and immediately started to work on what will consummate in a new capitol building or buildings on the old site in Salem. The act authorized the expenditure of \$2,000,000 of which the federal government will donate 45 per cent.

Martin Talks to Group
Initiating the meeting, Governor Martin addressed the group briefly, extending his congratulations that "Oregon was able to obtain the services of nine leading citizens for this important work."

REVENUE AGENTS SHOT TO DEATH

TULSA, Okla., Dec. 4. — (AP) — A federal revenue agent, Louis Pappan, 42, and George Stewart, 39, former Tulsa detective captain, were shot to death at the swanky Sheridan night club here today after they had been ejected by two "bouncers."

County Attorney Holly Anderson declared the shooting was "worse than murder."

The two "bouncers," Tyree Parks and G. R. McCullough, declared Pappan and Stewart had attempted a holdup. The men were arrested and Roy Blasley, club manager, was placed in jail.

Harry Brill, Pappan's superior, said the agent's work was "such that it might take him anywhere at any time."

Vernon Houston, a taxi cab driver, who took Pappan and his companion to the club, said they had visited two other places during the night and had inspected beer licenses.

ACTOR, DIRECTOR TRADE WALLOPS

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Dec. 4. — (AP) — A two-punch battle on film's front, quiet for months, has left the "be-man" combatants, Actor Spencer Tracy and Director William Wellman, still "good friends."

The burly screen star laughed off the tilt, which was disclosed as occurring last Sunday night at a popular cocktail room, and said: "We talked it all over, had our little laugh and our friendship is now on the same basis as ever."

The fracas was triggered off by Tracy's asserted resentment of a remark made by Wellman about an unidentified actress. Celebrities in the night spot were startled as Wellman apparently was struck a body blow and the actor received a clot on the head.

Mrs. Shelley's endorsed recipe follows:

Scrapple
4 cups water.
1 1/2 teaspoons salt.
1 cup cornmeal.
2 large pig hocks.
1 tablespoon caraway seed.
Bring the water and salt to a rapid boil. Slowly stir in the cornmeal and cook for five minutes, stirring occasionally. Reduce the heat and continue cooking until the mush is done (about 25 minutes). In the meantime, cook the pig hocks with the skins left on in slightly salted boiling water until tender. Remove the skins and shred the meat.
When the mush is cooked add the shredded meat and the caraway seed. Place in a loaf pan and let cool overnight. When cooled and firm slice in strips 1 inch thick and about 9 1/2 inches long. Roll in beaten egg then in fine cracker crumbs. Fry in hot fat in a heavy skillet, turning the strips until all sides are brown. Serve hot with catsup.
Serves six.

rim. The road will then extend back to the old rim highway at the base of Vidua Falls in Sun valley and on to park headquarters.

Choice of the route brings to an end discussions which have been held in regard to two different lines for the new construction. Mr. Canfield pointed out a "high line" proposal routed the new road the same as the approved route from Kerr to Sun valley, but instead of joining the old road at Vidua Falls, it brought the road on over Garfield ridge and along its slopes to Crater lake lodge.

The "low line" was in effect the same route that has been used from park headquarters to the east entrance checking station since the rim road was first built in 1919. Each proposed route had its proponents and opponents and a deadlock in the choice of routes was terminated by Mr. Ickes.

The completed construction of the final units will represent an approximate outlay of \$650,000, the expenditures being spread over a number of park seasons, Mr. Canfield said.

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SERIOUS BLAZE IS AVERTED BY KEEN NOSE OF WORKER

What Fire Chief Roy Elliott said might have been a serious fire at the Chevrolet agency at 32 North Riverside avenue was averted early this morning because of the acute sense of smell of Howard Goldsmith, 308 Haven street.

Goldsmith was doing some repair work at the Medford Domestic Laundry, adjoining the Chevrolet agency when, at 2:40 this morning, he smelled something burning. Investigation revealed a fire in the rear of the agency next to the garage. He sounded an alarm and the chemical crew of the fire department responded.

Meantime Patrolman Walter Reinling broke through a rear window to get at the fire. He cut his left wrist in breaking the glass. He and the chemical crew soon had the blaze extinguished.

Fire was caused by a short circuit resulting when an electric light extension cord wrapped around a nail in the wall became bare. The electric spark set fire to some papers hanging on the wall and in a short time the blaze would have been serious. Chief Elliott said in advising that caution be used in stringing wires.

Due to the prompt discovery of the blaze and the quick work in putting it out, no damage resulted, the chief reported.
