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CCC WORK IN PARK IMPORTANT PHASE, REPORT DISCLOSES

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., Dec. 5.—(Sp.)—The importance of Civilian Conservation work in the maintenance and development of Crater Lake National park is revealed in the narrative report of CCC activities in the park, as announced today by the park superintendent's office. Despite a comparatively short season, a total of 11,882 man days of labor was accomplished by Crater Lake enrollees, covering a wide range of projects. Important in the endeavours was the suppression of forest fires in the park area in cooperation with the park ranger force. Although there were 28 fires reported during the summer season, only four acres of park area was involved as a result of efficient fire fighting methods used by the enrollees.

Improvements of lasting benefit were completed and begun during the season, including the grading of the Rim area in preparation for hard surfacing. A total of 2,256 man days was devoted to this project which covered 310 square yards. A brief review of other activities includes 26 acres of general cleanup in the Rim area and park headquarters; five acres campground development at Gold Spring and Lost Creek; 13.5 acres fire hazard reduction along power lines; 18.0 miles horse trail maintenance; construction of 300 foot snow tunnel at base of "The Watchman" on west rim; repairing five snowshoe cabins; maintenance of plants and 11 acres of sod at park headquarters and Rim area; planting 1,072 trees and shrubs; 2.5-acre sodding; five acres soil preparation; building of three horse corrals; telephone line maintenance; planting of 120,000 fish; 20 miles highway maintenance; laying of drains and pipes; 45 miles truck trail cleanup. Minor projects completed by the Crater Lake CCC enrollees are numerous, accomplishing a surprisingly large amount of work during the short season of four months in the park.

HANSCOM HEARING IS EXPECTED SOON

Governor Martin, as soon as pressure of executive business, attendant upon starting of the capital reconstruction commission session, is expected to set a date for a hearing on the application of Earl Hanscom, former Eagle Point district resident, serving life in the state prison for second degree murder. The matter has been pending before the chief executive for three months. Hanscom claims extenuating circumstances, and that his constitutional rights were invaded in his sentence. Petitions for and against clemency have been filed by Jackson county residents. Hanscom plead guilty to second degree murder, for the death of a friend and neighbor, Albert Tingler, as the tragic climax of a fist fight, in front of an Eagle Point dance hall in June, 1933. A grand jury hearing on the attempted bribery of Dan Kellher former state parole officer, by L. A. Banks, former local agitator serving life for second degree murder, is due to start soon in Marion county. Banks and Kellher, allegedly entered into a contract, whereby Banks was to pay Kellher \$50,000 for release from the penitentiary. The grand jury investigation has been pending for six months.

The New Jersey court of pardons is the final tribunal to which Hauptmann may bring his case should he fall in his right before the U. S. supreme court. The governor said that while he did not direct Parker to investigate the Lindbergh kidnaping case, "all along, since I have been in office, he (Parker) has discussed the matter whenever there were any new developments." Later, William S. Conklin, the governor's press aide, revealed the governor also had urged all other members of the court of pardons to visit Hauptmann. "The governor has suggested and urged that all members of the court of pardons visit Hauptmann at prison and learn his side of the case first-hand," Conklin said.

In the cigarette field, it is claimed, the double money back appeal was originated by the Old Gold folks.
